



A chapter from the study book, "The Island Beautiful," was read by Mrs. . N. McKay, and Mrs. Ross Hammond gave an interesting paper on St. columba, for whom the organization was named. Mrs. Hammond said in part that the saint was born at Tryconnel, in the sixth century, was of royal descent and that he was educated at Moville. She pointed out that he went to Scotland, where, with his followers, he established a monastery on the Island of Iona, and with this as headquarters worked through Argyleshire and a great part of the country north of the Grampians, spreading the news of the Gospel among the Highlanders, who until that time were untouched by Christianity of any kind, and that after doing this splendid missionary work he occupied himself making a copy of the Bible, at which work he was engaged when he died. After this interesting paper Miss Anna McKay read a letter from India which had been received recently by the Grace Country Club, in which was contained the thanks of the missionaries for the Christmas bales. 
