DOMINION ELECTION

Reciprocity opens our markets to the products of thirteen other countries, every one of which has a high tariff against Canada and if reciprocity passes they have a right to dump their products on our market free while we will not be allowed to enter their market without paying high duties.

Over 400,000,000 people live in these countries. A partial list of the products of the farm exported from these countries more than they consumed is given below:

Table listing exports from the United States, Argentina, Austria-Hungary, Denmark, Sweden, Russia, and Australia, including items like eggs, butter, wheat, and cheese.

The other countries which will have access to our market on similar terms to the United States are Japan, Spain, Switzerland, Venezuela, Bolivia, Norway and Colombia whose exports we have been unable to obtain.

Canada's total exports of farm products 1910, \$108,347,694.

Does the foregoing present a cheering outlook for the Canadian farmer?

The Egg Market. Sir Wilfred said: "A bird in hand is worth two in the bush." The Canadian farmer can say an egg in his own nest is worth two in the bush-nest that holds eggs at all seasons of the year in many parts of the States when he can only produce them extensively in the summer.

Last year Canada consumed over 700,000 dozen eggs more than she produced and yet they tell us the farmer gets no benefit from protection.

The United States exported to Canada last year 750,000 dozen eggs; Hong Kong, 41,245 dozen; Chinese Empire, 87,075 dozen.

Fruit. Owing to climatic conditions the fruit and vegetable industry merits protection. Any duties collected before the Canadian product is on the market are revenue duties.

Horses. The horse trade in Canada was never better than now nor have higher prices ever been paid for horses.

Sheep. Australia and New Zealand sent into Canada in 1910, \$58,989 pounds of butter, 1,149,979 pounds of fresh mutton and lamb, 107,383 pounds of canned meats and paid the duty on same.

Wheat. Argentina produced 193,000,000 bushels of wheat last year. She can land said wheat in Montreal for 5 1/2 cents per bushel, while it costs the western farmer 10 cents per bushel to carry his wheat from Winnipeg to Port Arthur.

Meats. Who fixes the prices of meats in Chicago, New York, Philadelphia, Washington and every town and city in the United States? It is the Meat Trusts.

As the campaign advances the fact becomes more apparent that the Canadian Electors never gave the issues of the campaign the same consideration that they are giving this and everything

points to the conclusion that there is too much doubt involved in the reciprocity pact to warrant the farmers and all other electors taking the chance. The Conservatives will carry the country with a mighty sweep.
