The Egg Market.

Sir Wilfred said: "A bird in hand is worth two in the bush." The Canadian tarmer can say an egg in his own nest is worth two in the bush-nest that holds eggs at all seasons of the year in many parts of the States when he can only produce them extensively in the summer.

Last year Canada consumed over 700, ooo dozen eggs more than she produced and yet they tell us the farmer gets no benefit from protection.

The United States exported to Canada last year 750,000 dozen eggs; Hong Kong, 41,245 dozen; Chinese Empire, 87,075 dozen.

Canada exported 164,835 dozen of which 39,917 dozen went to the United States.

Fruit.

Owing to climatic conditions the fruit and vegetable industry merits protection.

Any duties collected before the Canadian product is on the market are revenue duties.

Tropical fruits come into Canada free and of these last weer this country in the country in

and of these, last year this country imported \$5,306,779 worth.

Fruit growers only ask protection on the lines they grow, and grow successfully in Canada.

Horses.

The horse trade in Canada was never

The horse trade in Canada was never better than now nor have higher prices ever been paid for horses.

The prices paid in Canada are indisputably better than in the United States. Ontario farmers ship millions of dollars worth to the North West every year.

Reciprocity will lose that market absolutely.

Sheep.

Australia and New Zealand sent into Canada in 1910, 568,989 pounds of butter, 1,149,979 pounds of fresh mutton and lamb, 107,383 pounds of canned meats and paid the duty on same. How much will they send in when duty is taken off?

There are 56,000,000 sheep in the United States against 2,875,000 in Canada.

20,000 sheep and lambs were brought from the United States and sold on Toronto market within the past six

months, and duty paid.

The United States produced in 1908, 296,915,000 pounds of wool, Canada produced 11,210,000 pounds.

Wheat.

Argentina produced 193,000,000 bushels of wheat last year. She can land said wheat in Montreal for 5½ cents per bushel, while it costs the western farmer to cents per bushel to carry his wheat from Winnipeg to Port Arthur.


