# ONTARIO FOR

Province Gives Government Ma-Jority of Fifty-Seven.

Overwhelming Support of Conservative Administration and Its Policies Is Voiced at Polls-Conservatives Have Eighty-Three Seats and Liberals Twenty-Six - Hon. Dr. Reaume Defeated.

TORONTO, June 30. - After a hard contest, in which the province evinced more enthusiasm on both sides than for many years, the voters of Ontario returned Sir James Whitney to power with a majority of fifty-seven seats. The latest returns indicate that the standing in the new House will be as follows:-


