A COURSE of Instruction in Civil Engineer-  
ing at King's College by Mr. McMahon Cro-

ment of the instruments used by Engineers, both  
for field and office work; Levelling; method of  
determining best route for Railway, &c.; compu-  
tation of the quantities of land, earthwork, &c.,  
required for the execution of the works; estima-  
tion of comparative labour by units of work;  
Horse power of Machinery, &c.; method of  
"setting out" Railway curves and side widths;  
calculation of gradients and theory of inclined  
planes; super-elevation of rail; composition of  
and resolution of forces; calculation of strains and  
pressures; strength of materials; theory and  
practice of timber and iron framing; viaducts,  
bridges, &c.  
Three Lectures a week will be given in the  
College, and instruction in the field will also be  
given once a week, or as often as may be expedi-  
ent.
