#### DRUGS VALUED AT MILLION SEIZED

Montreal.—A Court House official stated that during the past year \$1,000,000 worth of cocaine, morphine, opium and heroin was smuggled into Montreal, of which amount \$200,000 worth was seized by the authorities and sent to Ottawa, where it was destroyed. Records of the Recorder's Court show that 35 people died from narcotic poisoning in the past year. Most of the confiscated drugs were seized on the waterfront.

## HOCKEY

### PLAYING GOAL

To play in goal one requires a sharp eye and to be cool at all times and just to try to stop the shots that are direct on goal—by that I mean not to try to stop the puck when it is to one side of the post or over the cross bar as you are apt to deflect the puck into the net where otherwise it would have passed by. A goal tender must depend most on the use of hands to stop the shots similar to a man catching a base ball as it is natural that you can move your hands faster than you can shift your body to block the puck. One who is used to catching ball will develop into a good tender quicker than one who is not.

At times it is necessary to keep out from your goal to block shots and check the player, but this is not always good policy as a tricky forward will lead you to it too often. The angle shots from the wing require a lot of practice to gauge correctly and one must be coached a lot in this attack.

One must have nerve and confidence in himself and be careful of the lazy ones, those rolling shots. Make sure of them or they may fool you. You must be quick to clear the puck after stopping it to avoid the rush in on the goal.

Thus you need to have a quick movement of your feet and body as well as your hands. Look out for those shots between the knee and the ankle. Keep your pads tight together so the puck don't slip through. The use of your stick is important, but contrary to the general thought more shots are stopped by the body and hands than your stick.

Then you must learn to know your position with the defence men helping you out to defend the goal so as not to interfere with one another.

In conclusion, would like to inform any one who is desirous of buying out the position the club has purchased a new set of pads, protector, gauntlets, etc., and will welcome any candidate who desires to try to make the team.

MORE LUMBERING.

Much Timber Killed by Spruce Budworm is Being Converted into Laths. But Much Will Be Lost.

Lumbering operations will be carried on throughout the Province and more extensive scale during the present winter than last year, according to Hon. C. W. Robinson, Minister of Lands and Mines, who was at the Royal recently and who said also that the amount of laths being cut this year was much above normal.

The demand for laths continued high, he said. In connection with the sawing of laths, Mr. Robinson said they that had been killed by the spruce budworm, but even with the large amount of laths being sawn the dead spruce and fir standing could not be salvaged before it was past being of use for the purpose. Mr. Robinson said that while the lumbering operations of this season would be much greater than last season he did not expect that the season cut would be more than normal. St. John Telegraph.

#### SOME WASH-DAY HINTS

Cut up two or three pieces of paraffin saved from jelly jars. Put this in the wash-bottle before boiling clothes and you will be surprised at the whiteness of the clothes.

Use a clothes-pin bag that ties around your waist. In this put a hot-water bag on a cold day along with the clothes-pins, and both you and the pins keep warm until all the clothes are hung on the line.

In hanging out clothes in cold weather, add a little salt to the rinsing water and the clothes will not freeze to the line.

Add a little borax to the water in which the kitchen towels are washed. It removes the dirt and grease, makes them a good color and acts as a disinfectant.

Is the baby mother who wash the baby's jackets or the children's sweaters in the usual way and then put them in a clean pan and set in a warm place to dry, they will be like new. Turn them often and shake a little as they dry.

Never sprinkle pongee to iron. Roll in a towel while wet and iron when still damp.

To iron men's soft collars, begin at the points and press toward the center of the back. This will prevent the unsightly wrinkles that are usually seen on the home-laundried collars.

When ironing a garment that has a row of buttons, fold a Turkish towel into several thicknesses, lay the garment, buttons down, on the towel and iron it on the wrong side. The buttons will sink into the towel and the garment will be smooth and well ironed.

If you burn an article ironing it, wet the goods and apply corn-starch to the burned part, rubbing it in well. Allow this to dry and all traces of the burn will have disappeared.
