## LAWRENCETOWN PLANS \$10,000 SCHOOLHOUSE

Social and Personal Items of Interest About Well Known People

Lawrencetown.—At the adjourned Annual School meeting at Lawrenceston on Tuesday evening, attended by a large and enthusiastic gathering of the ratepayers of the section, it was unanimously decided to vote \$10,000 for the erection and equipment of a new building, building operations to begin in the near future.

A building committee, composed of the trustees—Dr. L. R. Morse, chairman; John Stoddard and Fred L. Bishop, with additional members, T. G. Bishop, H. H. Whitman, L. D. Hanley and A. P. Ramsey were appointed. Several sites for the new building are being considered, but choice is likely to be made of the location on which the old building stands; this to be enlarged by the purchase of the land adjoining.

Lawrencetown's record as an educational centre has been a notable one, and it is the intention of the ratepayers of the section to maintain the reputation already established by providing an up-to-date school building.
