





THE EFFECT OF WEATHER ON TRIM.—Sir Heibert Christison, the great Soxed chemist, has made some curious observatives on the effects of a cold, wet season indiminishing the normal growth of trees. He found on careful measurement that, compaining 1879 with 1878, eleven deciduous treeshout oaks—made on an average 41 per cert less growth in last year than the year before. Of seventeen pine trees, the average deciency was 20 per cent, so that heat appear to have more to do with the making of wood than moisture has. It is strange that the growth of the oak, which drops its learn, seems less dependent on heat than that the pine, which we usually associate with very cold regions. THE EFFECT OF WEATHER ON TREE
