out by the Committee, were thus summarized :- 1. Political influence unfavourable to the enforcement of the law. 2. The fear of offending the liquor party, evinced by both the Federal and the Provincial Governments, 3. A low moral tone in society which tacitly condones perjury when committed in the interests of the traffic. 4. The difficulty in obtaining detectives. 5. The burden of enforcement being thrown on private citizens, and the want of proper machinery for the discovery and conviction of offenders; and (6) the weariness in well doing of many temperance men. Surely it is a marvel that an Act environed by such adverse conditions should have been in any degree beneficial! And yet the good effects of the Scott Act have been amply attested, and are now seen in a more lurid light by the results of repeal. In three contiguous counties in Ontario forty-four Sessions had watched the workings of the Scott Act for three years, and now have watched the change to license for one year, and their verdict is distinct and clear as to the superiority of a pro-(Continued on first page.)
