The consuraction of the Siberian Railsay is being pashed forward with considerable activi'y, and tho hop, is entertained that the stretch betreen Zlatouet and Tcheliabiask will be open Ior traffic in Decembet next. The sleepers and rails are being laid durn on that section of the line situated alon; the Cessure River, in the eatreme cast of Siberia.-Dientry

Tue Northern Pacific Railway Compzoy are pushing the improvement on their coast lises. Trevtles are being filled in, permaneat bridges built, the track straightened in a number of plases and heary grades sut dowa. The averáge grade on the compzny's lines, when this work is all complited, will according to ats engineers, not be more than one-half per cent. except in the monntain division.

IAST year it was noted that the statistics of shipbuilding both in the Old Conntry and the Canadian Maritime Provinces indicated that sailing vessels were coming again into fashion. This prediction is bovae oal by tho latest fig. ures, which ahow that during 1592 the sail tonnage built has been one-third more than last year, while steam tonnage has fallen off one. sixth. The smaller and cheaper craft are ablo, where time is not an object, to make much better rates to shippers than the ocean greyhounds. Everything has tu come down to a muncy basis.
The Noill Chine Duily Netes reports that, "Her Brit.anac Majesty's Counsel at Mankow, Mr. C. Gardner, proposes to take a very important step towards stopping the further issue of an'i frircign placards in Hausn. He proposes to beard the IIunan lion in his dets by visiting the Governor of the provinco of Changsha, whither he will be conveyed by II.M.S. Esl; and we may be confident that the braggart voices of the Mananese who have vorred that their sacred soil shall never be melluted by the armed foot of the forcigocr, will be hushed to a respectful marmur when they aec a British man-of-war at anchor in the river that bsthes their capital. It is a bold and at the samo time a very politic step, and we coogratalate all the powers that be that have had to be consulted before it could be taken, on having docided on acnding a British Counsel, and so able a man as Mr Gardner, in a British man of war into the heart of Huama."
IT is remarked by the clerk of forestry for Ontario that the high water level of the Georgian bay has Inwered fous fect daring the last cight years. The reason given for this by some perenas is the denading of the forests by lam. bermen at tho head waters of the streams which flow into the laite. This may be natare's warning that we have been tim oxtraragant with our timber resoesces. The Cauadion Lumber. man, discussing this qucation, says: "Carcfally calculatiug what remains of nooded land in a large number of countica, and remembering cspecially its rich abandance in certain special districts, it will be granted that a timber fam. ine is not yet imminent in Ontario. And yot one cannot consijer tho history of the thirtytro countics the forcatry report has singled ont for mention withoal being face to face rith the fact thas similar extravaganco Si the danagemeat of almost ray other dopartment of business, public.ar personal, would hare long since resaltcd in disastrons baskraptcy."
