HOW TO USE DR. RIEGGER'S EAU ANTI-NEVRALGIQUE.

Pour a few drops of the liquid into a teaspoon and inhale it through the nostril on the side affected, in the same way as you would take smult, but with greater force and more rapidly

Always close the opposite nostril with the finger, so that the inhalation will be stronger.

If, after inhaling, the pain is not entirely soothed, this means that the operation was not well performed, and it should be commenced over again at once, and continued until the pain has entirely disappeared.

If pain is felt at the same time on both sides of the head or gums, both nostrils should be used to inhale, but each in succession, care being taken to close the opposite nostril while one is in operation.



NOTICE.—The liquid should never be poured in the hand, for the inhaling is then never perfect. For toothache, also use the nostrils. In the course of time, this Water loses its color, and a sediment is seen. This should in no way be noticed, as it does not after the quality of the liquid.
