GASOLINE ADDITIVES

health risks, especially to young children, environmental risks and the damage to pollution controls by continuing to allow this insidious neurotoxin to be added to unleaded gasoline in Canada. This compound has been banned in the United States since 1978.

In January of this year, after the direct intervention and appeals of five major car manufacturers, three automobile parts manufacturers associations, environmental organizations and academics and medical specialists, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency again rejected an application to allow MMT in U.S. unleaded fuel.

Why are Canadians not being afforded the same protection as our neighbours to the south? Why is this government willing to ignore the evidence and willing to continue to risk the health of Canadians, especially our children?
