In addition to the usual corrections, revisions, etc., a glossary of terms in common use by dog fanciers has been introduced.

An effort has been made to maintain the reputation the work has won on account of the high character and abundance of its illustrations, by a few substitutions of more modern specimens and the addition of several full-page cuts of breeds of dogs not illustrated in the first edition. For the originals of these the author is indebted to several persons who kindly allowed the use of cuts for the first edition, and also to Mr. James L. Little, of Brookline, Mass.; Mr. H. B. Donovan, editor of the Canadian Kennel Gazette, Toronto; Mr. L. A. Klein, of Black Lake; Mr. MacHaffie, of Cornwall, and others.

The index has also been rendered more complete, so that it is believed that the work will be found thoroughly accurate and up to date in all respects.

The author is led to hope that the book will be found worthy of the confidence of the general reader and of students and practitioners of veterinary medicine in the future as it has in the past.
