experience of this kind how cheered one is to come across a "humble man of heart?" an anxious enquirer! And this is, I am glad to say, not of unfrequent occurrence.

The regular order of service has not been broken throughout the year, viz.: three each Sunday, excepting once a month, when there are but two; service on holydays generally, three special week-day services during Advent and Lent.

During the summer months our numbers were greatly increased by visitors from other parts, who came to enjoy our beautiful Lake; and in order to obtain morning service at both centres on Sundays, one of the Lennoxville students lent his assistance. Mr. Judge helping the first month, and Mr. Lee the second.

It is with much gratification that I record the undertaking of additional work in a district about six miles distance from Magog, towards Massawippi Lake. A man from that district, tired of Advent preachers, came to St. Luke's Church, Magog, on Christmas, and he was so deeply moved that he remained to see me privately. pleaded with me to visit him and his neighbors and begin to hold services. This I declined, seeing that the region was wholly given to "isms," and again, because there was more than I could do satisfactorily in the region known to me and under my care. However, he returned saying that he had been speaking with others and that they all desired it and would pay for my trouble. The pay did not move me, for I could not think of taking extras, but it did seem as if I should be guilty were I not to obey this call. Shortly after New Year I began, taking a few friends at first to aid in response, and have been encouraged to keep them up since. Already we have a fair little congregation of young men and women chiefly, who are most attentive to the teachings given, and who have learned to enter themselves into the prayers of our Mother Church. Five have been baptized, and several more are in preparation. Let us thank God and take courage.

Through the kind assistance of young ladies in the two centres of work, the Sunday Schools have prospered. Misses Sweeney, Phelan and Harrower in Magog, and Misses Tuck, Packard and Bullock in Georgeville, doing their duty faithfully.
