PRESIDENT WILSON IS TIRED OF SERIES OF INSULTS BY HUERTA

UNITED STATES MARINES WILL LAND IN MEXICAN SEAPORTS IN THIRTY-SIX HOURS

HUERTA'S LONG SERIES OF INSULTS FORCE UNITED STATES TO ACTION SAID WILSON IN URGING SUPPORT

Tampico Affair Crowning Affront to Dignity—Full Power to Take Whatever Measures Are Necessary to Execute Reprisal Desired by Administration, But Hope of Peace Not Abandoned.

WASHINGTON, April 20.—President Wilson laid the Mexican question before congress today in these words: "Gentlemen of the congress: It is my duty to call your attention to a situation which has arisen in our relations with Gen. Victoriano Huerta at Mexico City, which calls for action, and to ask your advice and co-operation in acting upon it.

Resolution Passed to Justify Employment of Armed Forces

WASHINGTON, April 20.—The joint resolution passed by the house, and which was before the senate at a late hour tonight, read as follows: "A joint resolution justifying the employment of the armed forces of the United States enforcing certain demands against Victoriano Huerta—Resolved by the senate and house of representatives in congress assembled that the president of the United States is justified in the employment of the armed forces of the United States to enforce the demands upon Victoriano Huerta for unequivocal amendments to the government of the United States for affronts and indignities committed against this government by Gen. Huerta and his representatives."

TEXT OF PROTOCOL REJECTED BY U.S.

Insisted That Starry Flag, Be Hoisted When Salute Be Fired.

INCIDENT EXPLAINED

Zeal of Subaltern Said to Have Caused Arrest of Marines.

MEXICO CITY, April 20.—The text of the protocol by Mexico, refused signature by the United States was as follows: "With a view of putting an end to the lamentable incident which occurred on the 6th instant at Port Tampico caused by the detention of five men and one American officer, the undersigned that such marines were immediately put at liberty by General Zaragosa, commander of Port Tampico, and that said officer presented an apology to Rear Admiral May, commander of the American squadron in those waters; that afterwards, when the president of the republic of Mexico became advised of the facts he expressed regret thru the office of foreign relations for the incident, and ordered that a full investigation be made to the end that the guilty might be punished if any be found guilty, and finally, that the action in question was due to the zeal of a subaltern, which might be regarded as excusable if it had been taken into consideration that the marines when detained had gone ashore in uniform without permission of the military authorities, the port being at the moment not only in a state of war, but under attack by rebels, the charge of defiance of the United States and the minister of foreign relations of Mexico, acting in their official capacities, agree as follows: "Conditions of Salute. "First, that the Mexican Government, inspired by a desire of showing the goodwill it feels toward the people of the United States and desiring in the same manner to bring about the good relations between the two countries, binds itself that the American flag be saluted at Tampico by twenty-one guns from a Mexican shore battery or from a Mexican warship in those waters.

Eight Killed by Explosion At Hotel in Macoun, Sask.

Atlantic Fleet Will Arrive At Tampico Tomorrow Noon

ON BOARD THE U. S. S. ARKANSAS, at Sea, by Wireless via Key West, April 20.—Rear Admiral Charles J. Badger, commander-in-chief of the Atlantic fleet now hurrying to the Mexican Port of Tampico, was advised today by President Huerta's refusal to salute the American flag, and he is expecting specific instructions from Washington hourly. The American fleet will arrive at Tampico at noon on Wednesday.

TWO WORKMEN WERE KILLED ON NEW TORONTO BUILDINGS

One Crushed by Elevator in Dominion Bank, and Another Fell Into Excavation at New Methodist Book Room—Third Man Broke Arm and Leg.

Two fatal accidents occurred on downtown buildings yesterday afternoon within five minutes of each other. Louis Prior, a laborer, 62 Robert street, was instantly killed at the new Dominion Bank building, corner of King and Yonge, when an elevator crushed in his skull and Francesco Branzetti, a carpenter, died, while Miss Grant, a teacher of the Macoun schools, and Miss Stella Peterson, the hotel cook, who has a sister living in Winnipeg, are dying. Little hope is held out for their recovery.

FRANCE SERENE DURING CRISIS

Interest in Mexican Situation Mild, But Stocks Reflect Some Uneasiness. PARIS, April 20.—The attitude of the French Government toward Mexico is one of calm observation according to the view expressed at the foreign office today. A disposition exists here to remain detached from events in Mexico unless incidents should arise directly concerning France.

WILL BE NO WAR WILSON DECLARED

United States Friendly to Mexico—Seizing Ports Not Act of War.

WASHINGTON, April 20.—"Don't get the impression that we are going to have war with Mexico," President Wilson today told the Washington correspondents. "Under no circumstances would we fight the Mexican people; we are their friends."

MEXICAN PAPERS BACK UP HUERTA

Attitude of U. S. Declared to Be Wholly Unreasonable—Appeal for Calmness.

MEXICO CITY, April 20.—The newspapers of the federal capital today restricted themselves to very brief comment on the statement given out by the foreign minister, devoting themselves chiefly to expressions of approval of the attitude taken by the Mexican Government. El Imparcial declared that Gen. Huerta had given "high proof of his discretion and loyalty," and concluded: "A people like a man, should prefer death to dishonor."

ARMY OF NURSES READY FOR SERVICE

Forty-Five Hundred Prepared to Accompany United States Army.

WASHINGTON, April 20.—The American Red Cross has 4500 nurses enrolled and ready for service with the forces in Mexico, according to a statement today by Miss Mabel T. Boardman, the Red Cross's executive secretary.

FIFTY MILLIONS FOR U. S. DEFENCE

Bill Introduced in Senate Recalls That Before the Spanish War.

WASHINGTON, April 20.—A bill to appropriate \$50,000,000 to be expended by the president was introduced by Senator Chamberlain, chairman of the military affairs committee, to which the bill was referred. "The Chamberlain bill provides: "That the president of the United States be and he is hereby authorized to expend in his discretion for the national defence and for each and every purpose connected therewith the sum of fifty million dollars out of any moneys in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, which sum shall remain available until expended."

GENERAL COAL STRIKE IF WAR IS DECLARED

Haywood Says Hostilities Will Be Followed by Miners' Walk-out.

NEW YORK, April 20.—War between the United States and Mexico denounced in resolutions adopted at a meeting of the International Workers' Defence League, addressed by Industrial Workers of the World and Anarchist leaders in Carnegie Hall last night. The speakers included William D. Haywood and Alexander Berkman. Haywood declared that a signal for war given by President Wilson would mean a general strike in the country's coal mines, as this strike has already been authorized should war be declared.

DISCUSSED PLANS FOR SEA AND LAND FORCES

Admiral Dewey Presided Over Army and Navy Board Meeting.

WASHINGTON, April 20.—The joint army and navy board, headed by Admiral Dewey, today had its first session in many months. It discussed plans for co-operation of the army and navy in case it becomes necessary to adopt measures in Mexico. Major-General Wood, chief of staff, and Major-General Witherspoon, assistant chief, attended the meeting.

GENERAL WOOD IN COMMAND

WASHINGTON, April 20.—Secretary of War Garrison announced today that in the event of hostilities with Mexico, Major-General Leonard Wood, chief of staff of the army, would command the American forces.
