

There is only one trouble with this marvelous achievement, and that is its impossibility so long as present naval conditions prevail. If the German sub-marines had succeeded in seriously crip-pling the British fleet or had accomplish-ed anything noteworthy in harbor raids, the suggestion would hold real peril. The facts, unfortunately for the piece of fle-tion, are all the other way. So far from establishing a blockade themselves, the German submarines have utterly failed to break the English blockade of the North Sea and the channel. 





