- 2. The Chairman shall have a casting vote in case of a tie, but in ordinary cases shall not vote.
- 3. It shall be the duty of the Presiding Officer, and the privilege of any member, to call a member to order who violates any established rule of order.
- 4. A motion must be seconded, and afterwards repeated from the Chair, or read aloud, before it is debated: a motion shall be reduced to writing if any member require it.
 - 5. All Resolutions shall be submitted in writing.
- 6. A motion to amend an amendment to an amendment shall not be entertained.
- 7. When two or more members rise to speak at the same time, the Presiding Officer shall decide who is entitled to the floor.
- 8. No member shall speak more than twice, or longer than five minutes each time, on any question, without leave of the meeting, which leave shall be granted or refused without debate.
- 9. When a member is speaking no one shall interrupt, except for the purpose of calling to order, or asking of the Presiding Officer leave to explain: a member allowed to explain shall only have the right to explain an actual misunderstanding of language, and shall be strictly prohibited from going into debate on the merits of the case.
- 10, A motion to adjourn shall always be in order, except, 1st, when a member is in possession of the floor; 2nd, when the yeas and nays are being called; 3rd, when the members are voting; 4th, when adjournment was the last preceding motion.
- II. A motion to adjourn simply cannot be amended, but a motion to adjourn to a given time may be, and is open for debate.
- 12. The reading of any paper called for, relating to the subject under debate, shall always be in order.
 - 13. When the Presiding Officer has commenced to take a

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
