By a letter from A. C. Buchanan Esq. to the Editor of the Quebec Mercury, that gentleman expresses his opinion, that "the Emigration to Upper Canada will be great this year, but the run will be chiefly by New York; particularly of the better class." It were much to be desired that an intelligent, enterprising Agent for the Canadas, should be stationed at New York; who would open an office in that city, for furnishing intelligence and advice to emigrants respecting these colonies. If such a step were taken, thousands of valuable emigrants, who come out to settle in the States, or who come out with the intention, originally, of settling in Canada, but who, on their arrival at that port, are misled by the misrepresentations of interested agents, to alter that intention, and to settle in the Western States, would unquestionably be induced, to the mutual benefit of themselves, and the colony, to settle in Upper Canada. There is at present an office in New York, for the purpose of affording gratuitous information to British Emigrants. — It is kept by a person
