J. DUNDEE IS EASY FOR THE CHAMPION

All But Two Rounds for
Benny Leonard at
Newark, N. J.

Newark, N. J., Jan. 20.—Benny Leonard, lightweight champion, had no difficulty in outpointing Johnny Dundee of New York, in an eight-round bout at the First Regiment armory here tonight. The contestants weighed in at 3 p.m., Leonard tipping the scales at 134½ pounds and Dundee at 130.

With the exception of the first and third rounds, which were

In the second and fourth rounds Leonard kept his opponent away with left hooks to the face and in the next round quickened the pace, cornering Dundee and sending in left hooks and short right uppercuts.
