"No money" is the sign that may as well be hung out by the banks to those applying for loans on stock collateral. It is difficult to procure an extra dollar from the financial institutions for stock market purposes now that the strain from the west has made a real appearance. Heavy marketing of crops is expected as soon as they can be brought out, the weakness in cereal prices being considered specially conducive to early realizing on the part of the farmer. Crop reports this year promise to surpass those for several years, and particularly those of the previous two years, a period of prices, in the main, above an export level. The stock market is consoling itself in the belief that the return for this season's crops will be in part available within three months for speculative use and that a livelier time will then be witnessed. During the first hour on the Toronto market this morning two sales, one of ten shares, and one of five shares, of Mackay Common comprised the entire business.




