resignation. Sir Oliver Mowat, the

Minister of Justice, evidently intends

to make his hand felt at Ottawa.

Quite a number of politicians were

in the Rosin House yesterday. Major

Jim Sutherland, the Liberal whip, was

holding a reception in Room 185, the

Rosin's "Red Parlor," and, backed up

by J. F. Lester, M.P., of Sarnia, he

was interviewed by a number of local

stalwarts, who, now that the battle is

on, are looking for their recompense,

more or less as the case may be.

Among the latter were the ever-evi-

dent Peter Ryan, who expects to re-

place Larkin, Connolly and contractor,

as Dominion Government contractor,

and thereby make a big pile. As Mr.

Ryan failed to become a Cabinet Min-

ister, it is considered only fair that

his services should now be rewarded

by some "good things" in the public

work line.

Another man who called upon Mr.

Sutherland was Mr. S. H. Jones, who

in the recent campaign put up as much

money as the eloquent Registrar did

oratory, and who therefore considers

that he should have a plum too. Mr.

Ryan would be satisfied with a term

at Government House as a first instal-

ment on account of his services. Mr.

Ryan's office "grab-bag" will be

empty before half the reward-hunters

are satisfied.

even state the Government's intentions

about the duty on coal.

Crack Shots at Bisley.

Opening of the Competition for the Queen's

Prize in Queen's Weather.

Canadians Did Well at the 300 and 500

Yards Ranges. Money Prizes Won by

Them in the Prince of Wales and

Other Matches—Weller Made the Possi-

ble in the Thorburn Match.

Bisley Common, July 20.—The com-

petition for the Queen's Prize began to-

day with the weather bright and

clear. Last year Private Hayhurst of

Hamilton won the coveted £250, being

the first colonial marksman to win it.

The match is shot in three stages, the

first being three ranges—200, 300 and

500 yards, the second stage being 300

yards at 600 yards, and the third, ten

shots each at 800 and 900 yards.

There are 500 prizes, worth £250, in-

cluding the £250, which goes with the

gold medal and gold badge given to the

mark of the highest score.
