Kingston's Penitentiary Has a Dark Tragedy.

SHOT THROUGH THE HEAD

George Howell Defied the Guards and Had a Pair of Shears

Guard Donnelly-He Would Not be Taken to the Dungeon and Would Not Throw Down His Weapon-There Was a Report, Which Meant Beath-Who

Fired the Shot ? Kingston, Ont., Oct. 8.-About 3.30 o'clock this afternoon, while endeavoring to overcome George Howell, a negro confined in the prison of isolation at the Penitentlary and remove him to the dungeon, a dire tragedy occurred and Howell is a dead man. He was about 30 years of age. In 1886 he was sent from Windsor for life for rape. His conduct has been very bad, his attacks on guards and convicts being

brutal.

His last act, which put him into the prison of isolation, was to assault Guard Kerrigan. Guard Donnelly reported Howell for insubordination to-day and Warden Metcalfe ordered his deprivation of light.

The order was read to him, when he went into a rage, and, seizing a pair of shears, threatened Donneily with disembowelment if he removed the lamp.

The dispute continued until Warden Metcalf called on officers to remove the convict to the dungeon. The negro gripped the shears and defied the posse.

There was an exciting five minutes while the guards parleyed with him. When he made a spring at one, after repeated or made a spring at one, after repeated or-ders to throw down his weapon, there was a report and Howell fell back on his bed. His head was pierced by a bullet entering his left eye. He continued to pour forth oaths and imprecations until death re-An inquest will be held.
