Building and Loan Companies. The Building and Loan Companies' Bill, introduced Wednesday, consolidating the legislation heretofore existing. It also provides for a system of registration and for special audits.

Each company, beginning at June 30 next, must register annually, and to do so must pay a fee of from \$50 to \$200. Every company must hereafter be incorporated by letters patent. The auditing must be done each year at the expense of the company.

The special auditor, who is to be appointed by the Registrar, is to go over the books, etc., in case of suspected irregularities. In the case of companies issuing terminating shares, their action is limited to the county in which they are formed.
