THE DETECTIVES' CLUE

Was Led to the Arrest of Bank Robber W. H. Ponton.

AN ALLEGED TELL-TALE SLIP OF PAPER.

Carrying an Impression of What Looked Like Manager Baines' Key

To the Lower Compartment of the Safe Claimed to Have Been Found by a Pinkerton Detective in Ponton's Bureau Drawer

Napanee, Oct. 13.—(Special.)—George Dougherty, one of the Pinkerton detectives, who has been actively engaged in the bank robbery case, occupied the victim's room for nearly nine hours to-day and produced evidence that created great surprise, although a bombshell was anticipated.

At the next interview with Ponton, on the following day, I went into the room of the bureau drawer, and the search was made for it. He said he thought Mr. Baines or Safe Expert Young suggested that the key which made after the robbery, that Baines was taken and that Baines had the candle lit in his hand and handed it to him, and he started out with the candle, followed by Green.

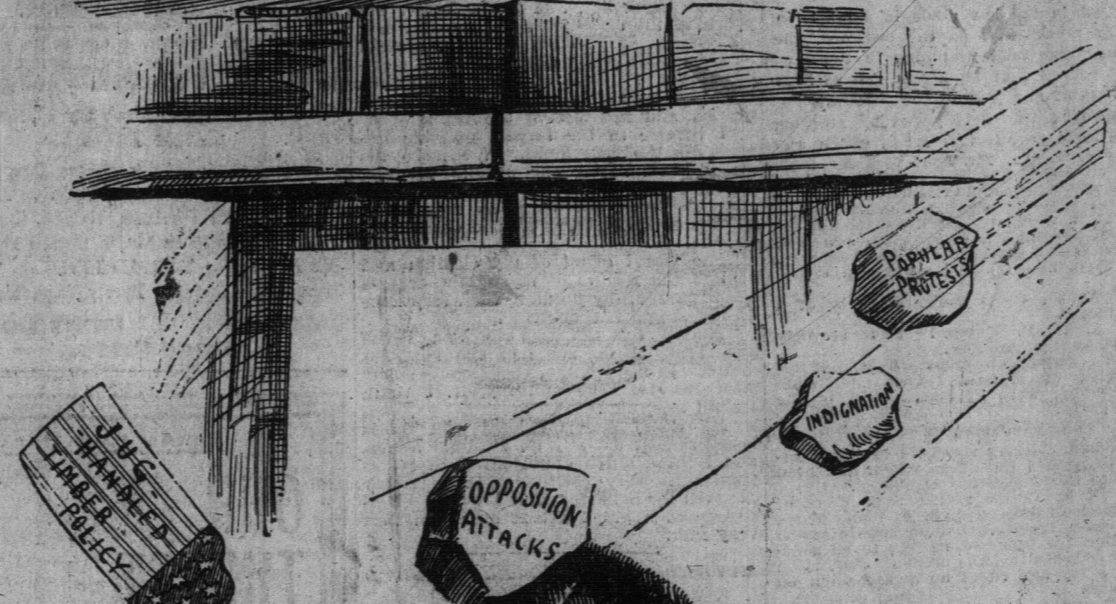
My next interview with Ponton was on Sept. 23, in my room. I took a general interest in his movements of the night of the robbery and had investigated. It was corroborated, exactly, that the key was in the safe.

There was a murmur of expectation when Detective George Dougherty, of the National Detective Association, National Division, took the witness stand at his story of the robbery.

"I have been in the detective business fifteen years, and arrived here on Sept. 1, conferred with Mr. Wilkes of our agency and Detective Greer. I examined the outside of the vault and found no marks of violence or drilling, nothing of that kind. I examined the knob of the combination and also the inside outside but found no evidence of violence.

"I asked him if he objected to me going to his room to make some examinations. He said he did not. We went over together and he showed me his key. He was in a hurry and wanted to catch the train, so I asked him to leave me the key. He did so, and on Oct. 1, he said he had not borrowed, nor had any extra money. All he had was \$20. He said there was an L.O.U. in the cash box, but he could not recollect the amount. He told me what salary he received—\$48.50 a month—and said it was hard to save any of it. He paid \$10 per month for board, \$10 on bicycle and \$10 to his mother. He could not figure out just what his personal expenses were.

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A RUSSIAN UMPIRE

M. Maertens will sit in judgment on the Boundary Dispute Between Britain and Venezuela.

Washington, Oct. 13.—The International Court of Arbitration, which is to pass on the British-Venezuela boundary, has been completed by the selection of M. Maertens, a distinguished Russian jurist, as umpire, and arrangements are being made for the assembling of the court at Paris, during the late summer or fall of next year.

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SHERMAN'S BACK-DOWN

Some Pretty Scathing Comments by Newspapers of London.

THE PROPOSED COLLATERAL CONFERENCE

Would Leave the Question Just Where It Is To-Day, Says The Graphic.

The Times Says There is No Reason to Quarrel With Secretary Sherman's Reply—Expressions of Astonishment Simply Intended to Cover the Attempt to Bluff the British Government—Daily News Suggests That a Good Way to Protect the Seal Herds Would Be to Compensate the Canadian Sealers for Abandonment of Their Right Under the Paris Award—Cable News.

London, Oct. 14.—The Daily Graphic says editorially this morning: "With characteristic ill-grace, Secretary Sherman has at last climbed down and agreed to Lord Salisbury's view of the Behring Sea Conference. If the proposed collateral conference with Japan and Russia ever meets, it will leave the question just where it is to-day."

The Daily News says: "Allowing for the peculiarities of American diplomacy, there is no reason to quarrel with Secretary Sherman's reply on the subject of the Behring Sea Conference. We entirely disbelieve that Lord Salisbury, in his oral communications with Ambassador Hall, ever departed from the position adopted in his final note of July 28. But it is unnecessary to deal seriously with expressions of astonishment obviously intended to cover the failure of an attempt to bluff the British Government in a manner disapproved by the leading organs of American opinion."
