Prussia Witnesses Scenes of Disorder Over Presence of Police

Berlin, Nov. 20.-The final Prussian Diet elections, which are usually sim ply quiet assemblages of the electors chosen at the polls, were to-day, in many districts, disorderly and even violent. The Socialists in the Second and Fourth Districts of Berlin refused to participate in the election until the police left the halls. The police heretofore had always been present by tolerance, but to-day were compelled to withdraw, when it was pointed out, after a controversy, that the law did not permit them to be present. The disturbances began in the Second District, owing to the overcrowding of a meeting hall by non-electors, who obstinately refused to vacate their places for electors. The election authorities summoned the police, but the electors and outsiders yelled in chorus: "Out with the bluecoats," and banged the tables with beer mugs until Herr Subeila, member of the Reichstag, pursuaded the police to retire, whereupon quiet was restored. In other districts, both here and in the provinces, the Socialists occupied the halls beforehand and occasioned similar scenes. The Socialists, however, will probably not win a single seat. and Fourth Districts of Berlin refused

GROCERS OF WINDSOR Object to Trainmen Carrying Butter and Eggs Free.

Windsor, Nov. 20.-The grocers of Windsor, in an effort to prevent the employes of the Wabash Railroad from oringing butter and eggs to Windsor from St. Thomas and way stations free of charge, petitioned the head officers of the road in the latter city to orficers of the road in the latter city to order the practice stopped. It is said the company replied by threatening to order a large number of their men to move to St. Thomas, where they can live cheaply. This order would mean that about 150 families would leave Windsor. Butter and eggs can be obtained very much cheaper around St. Thomas than in Windsor, and the rallroad men living in Windsor, take advantage of their work on the road to purchase the praduce. The practice diminishes the local grocery trade to a considerable extent.
