Serious Result of the Bear Island Fight.

A Porce of Eighty U. S. Troops Annihilated.

Minneapolis, Minn., Oct. 6.-Arthur P. Pegler, the staff correspondent of the Journal, wires at 8:30 this morning, from Walker, Minn.;

"The force of 80 men under Gen. Bacon have been annihilated. I do not know whether Inspector Tinker has more information than I have, but he sent word to the war department last night that the Third Infantry detachment had been wiped out.

"Either the troops have been driven inland, or there is not a man of them left. No answer from the signals of any kind was received, although we lay off on the whole length of the headland. To land was an impossibility in the dark, as the reinforcements from Brainerd have not arrived."

TRAPPED. St. Paul, Minn., Oct. 6.-The Globe's staff correspondent at Walker, Minn., telegraphs as follows: "Company B of the Third United States Infantry, commanded by Maj. Wilkinson, Lieut. Ross, and under charge of Gen. Bacon, was ambushed and trapped by the Pillager Indians, at Bear Island. The attack was a complete surprise to the troops, and on the first volley four of the men were stricken down. There were several Indians seen about the few log houses on the shore, but when the troops landed through the surf all

but one disappeared in the woods. "On landing, the soldiers proceeded to the house in which Bog-Ahe-Mah-Go-Shik resides when at home, but the chief, who had threatened to kill the soldiers in case they should be sent after him, was not at home. Marshal Sheehan, however, found Mah-Quod, a Pillager Indian, who was one of 22 who rescued the Pillager chief some weeks ago, and placed him under arrest.

"Mah-Quod put up a desperate fight, although the company of soldiers were draw up in front of the place. It required the assistance of four soldiers to subdue the prisoner and put the handcuffs on him. After Mah-Quod had been placed in the bow of the steamer, the troops formed columns of two and marched around the penin-REINFORCEMENTS.

News From the Flooded Districts in Georgia More Serious.

Savannah, Ga., Oct. 6.-News from the storm-stricken districts along the coast indicates that a hundred lives have been lost. News by way of a boat is that 50 people were drowned at Fernandina. From Campbell Island, inhabited by about 40 colored people, it is reported that all but three were drowned. At Brunswick four people lost their lives.

Martin Anderson, master of the steamer Hesse, from Darren, Ga., reports that 80 bodies have been found on Butler's Island. This runs up the total deaths from the late tidal wave to 100. Butler's Island was populated mostly by negroes.

SICKNESS IN THE SOUDAN

Disease and Death Among the Troops Increasing-German View of the Lancers' Charge.

London, Oct. 6. - A dispatch from Cairo says that sickness and death are increasing among the troops who have returned from the Soudan.

The London Telegraph's correspondent says he hears that Major Von Tiedemann, the German attache who accompanied the expedition, severely animadverts in his report to his government upon the conduct of the operations. He describes the tactics as bad, and says that the charge of the Twenty-first Lancers on the dervishes was folly.

CABLE NOTES.

Herr Birkner, a land owner, has presented to Emperor William an estate of 5,000 acres at Cadinen, West Prussia. There is a splendid manor house on the property, and the estate is well stocked with game.

It is rumored in interested circles that the Petersen-Tate shipbuilding firm at Newcastle, England, is again attempting to negotiate for the construction of the proposed line of fast steamers for Canada. No confirmation of the report, however, could be strain-

THE QUEEN'S

While Out Driving at Balmoral, Scotland.

The Royal Party Severely Shaken Up -Prince of Teck in Bad Health.

London, Oct. 6.-Queen Victoria, her daughter, the ex-Empress Frederick of Germany, and Princess Adolphe of Schaumburg-Lippe, had a narrow escape while driving at Balmoral, Scotland, on Monday. The horses of her Majesty's carriage bolted, and the coachman lost control of them, and serious accident was only averted by the horses turning into the woods, where the carriage strok between the trees. The members of the royal party were severely shaken and much

alarmed, but were not injured. Grave reports are in circulation regarding the condition of the Duke of Teck. His health is said to be extremely bad, and there is much anxiety. None but relatives are permitted to see him at present.

Chinese Foreign Office Brought to Time.

Reported Death of the Chinese Emper

or Officially Denied.

London, Oct. 6. - The Tsung Li Yamen has amply apologized for the assaults committed on Oct. 1 on the wife of the Italian minister and several Americans. Several regiments have been sent to Pekin to keep order. The scene of the attack on Saturday was inclosed by ropes, and eight offenders were pilloried into the enclosure. They wore heavy wooden collars, on which were the inscriptions "Punishment for Assaulting Europeans." Li Hung Chang has not yet returned to power, and there is a division of opinion among officials as to whether he will be rein-

stated. The Chinese legation at Paris publishes an official communication, formally denying all reports of the death of the Emperor of China. Prince Henry of Prussia has been ap-

pointed to command the squadron ininterests at Pekin and elsewhere in China. The United States cruiser Boston and the gunboat Petrel, accompanied by the collier Nero, have gone to China.

50,000 NAVVIES GO ON STRIKE

For an Advance in Their Small Wages The Peace Commissioners in Council.

Paris, France, Oct. 6.-About 50,000 navvies are out on strike for an increase from 10c to 12c an hour for a day of eleven hours. Although it is stated that private contracts made with the city prevent any other tariff the fact that the works of the great exhibition are pressing leads to the belief that the

contractors will give way.

The United States peace commission held its usual session yesterday from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. The commissioners continued their conference with Major-General Merritt, and practically con-cluded an extended canvass of the Philippine situation. The members of the commission refused to disclose the views of Gen. Merrit: or Admiral Dewey in regard to the policy to be pursued towards the people of the Philippines.

HERBERT SPENCER

Famous Philosopher's Condition Is Considered Desperate.

A London correspondent cables: "I hear on the best authority that the condition of Herbert Spencer is regarded by himself and his friends as desperate. The aged philosopher-he is now past 78 years old-calmly regards the approach of death, making all the final arrangements with characteristic composure and attention to detail."
