City Island, N. Y., Nov. 28.-A small schooner is sunk just east of Baker's Bluff, L. I. She is close in shore and well out of the water at low tide, but fills at high tide. NINE VESSELS LOST.

Gloucester, Mass., Nov. 28.-Nine

vessels were lost in the blizzard at this port, but nothing could be learned this morning as to the loss of life. It is believed that the crews of nearly all the craft escaped. In several instances no one was on board. Nearly all of the vessels lost were fishermen. Boston, Mass., Nov. 28 .- The management of the Portland Steamship Company announced at noon today that they had no information as to the whereabouts of the steamer Portland, which left the city on Saturday night for Portland. She had a fair-sized freight, and about 25 or 30 passengers.

DREYFUS AND PICQUART. Paris, Nov. 28 .- Madam Dreyfus, the wife of Capt. Alfred Dreyfus, the prisoner of Devil's Island, has, by permission of the authorities, received the following telegram from her husband: "I rejoice with all of you. My health is mentally and physically good." A committee of Leftist senators had

an interview with the premier, M. Dupuy, the minister of war; M. De Freycinet, and the minister of justice, M. Lebret. The senators demanded that the trial of Lieut.-Col. Picquart, on the charge of revealing important military documents to his counsel, be postponed until the decision of the court of cassation in the Dreyfus revision is announced. The French ministers did not indicate their probable action in the matter, M. Dupuy contenting himself with saying that he would refer the matter to the cabinet and give the committee a reply tomorrow. Several deputies have announced their intention of introducing a bill modifying the military laws and permitting ap peals from court-martials to the court of cassation.

THE FRENCH NAVY.

M. Lockroy's naval programme for the year 1889 has been modified at the last moment, and all of the proposed new battleships have been eliminated. Altogether 48 ships have been added to the navy for 1889 and 21 for 1900. France will then have more torpedo boats and torpedo boat destroyers than England.

SARA AT HOME.

The negotiations which were proceeding for a long time between Mme. Sara Bernhardt and the municipal council for the lease of the Theater des Nations were concluded yesterday, the council voting unanimously to accept Mme. Bernhardt's offer. Admiral Seymour Made an Important Move.

Britain Holds a Valuable Strategic Position-The Cape-to-Cairo Scheme Goes on Apace.

London, Nov. 28 .- Admiral Seymour, commanding the British squadron in Chinese waters, has hoisted the British flag over Ting Hai, capital of the Island of Chusan, and has stationed a formidable fleet of warships in that vicinity to defend his action.

The Chusan group forms one of the most strategic positions on the Chinese coast, from both military and commercial viewpoints, and its addition to the present British possessions there will

prove of great advantage. group, and among Chinese islands is second in size only to Hainan. The Chusan group is at the mouth of Hang Chau Bay, near the city of Hang Chau, which many travelers declare is the finest in the empire. It is also one of

the largest. IMPORTANT POSITION,

Britain's new possession also commands the mouth of the Yangtse Kiang River, the great artery of Central China, and the most densely populated region of its size in the world. The various mouths of the river are just north of Chusan.

London, Nov. 28. - Trans-African communication proceeds apace. Already the telegraph connects Cairo with Kassala. The British force is at Dufileh, beyond Lado, and an Egyptian gunboat has reached Mashra Rek, the port of the Bahr-el-Ghazal province. The Queen is deeply interested in the scheme of the Cape-to-Cairo Railway, and has recently expressed the hope that she may live to see its completion. There is reason to think that Germany has agreed to allow the Congo State to cede the strip of territory along Lake Tanganyika,

which is the only missing link. ANGLO-GERMAN ENTENTE. Concerning the scope of the Anglo-German agreement, it is stated that all that has happened is that England has become assured that German hostility will not block any action England may in the future have to take against the Boer oppression of the uitlanders and the hampering of the mine industry. For the moment peace is assured in South Africa, but it may be added that the present situation cannot continue indefinitely.

> The Loss of Life Is Heavy-Wind Blowing at a Hundred Miles an Hour-Blizzard in New York and Boston.
