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IT'S FIGHT TO A FINISH

Homesteader Will Never Give Up Dam to State While Alive.

Milwaukee, Aug. 3.—"I suppose that some day they will get me, but John Dietz is going out of here, feet first, leaving his empty gun behind him, and the place they will take me to will be the cemetery." This defiance was uttered by John Dietz, who has held the Cameron Dam in the Thornapple River for two years against the employees of the Mississippi Logging and Boom Company and the authorities. In an interview given to two newspapermen, who ventured through the woods of Sawyer County to his home yesterday, Dietz said: "How is the man I shot?" "He is Dietz's first words. 'I hope the fellow is not going to die,' he continued, 'because I don't want to kill anybody. The company has been laying traps for me for the last two years and they have not got me yet, though they nearly succeeded several times. They have persecuted me, sending in young fools, killing my cattle and sheep.

Speaking of Sheriff Gylland's posse, he said: "They were a fine lot of cowards, running at my name. I could have got the entire lot of them before they reached the woods. If I had wished to, but I went right on making hay. Any man who will shoot at women and children is a disgrace to the uniform of the state.

"The outcome gives me no concern. It is my duty to protect my family in their constitutional rights. I trust in God and believe that trust is not unfounded."

At the house the newspapermen met the family. The interior is cosy, but warlike, with stands of arms and boxes of cartridges.

Miss Abundia Dietz, the 13-year-old daughter, who was said to have taken part in the fight, said, "I suppose you expected to find a bunch of savages. Mother and I took no part in the battle of Wednesday other than to get father and the boys their guns and take care of the children. No I was not afraid, though some of the bullets did come very close."

A Milwaukee man, who was in Sawyer County last week, says the people there are greatly aroused and if troops are sent hundreds will shoulder their guns and go to the assistance of the Dietz family.

FUNERAL OF LATE JUSTICE STREET

Will Be Held Tomorrow Afternoon From Mrs. Becher's Residence.

The funeral of the late Mr. Justice W. P. R. Street, whose death occurred at Danville, N. Y., on Wednesday, will take place tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock from "Thornwood," the residence of Mrs. Becher, St. George street. The Bishop of Huron and Rev. Canon Dann, rector of St. Paul's (which the late Justice attended while a resident of London), will conduct the services both at "Thornwood" and Woodland Cemetery, where the interment will be made. The members of the Middlesex Bar will attend in a body. The remains will be brought to London tonight from Toronto, where services are to be held in St. Thomas' Church this afternoon.

Middlesex Bar Meets.

A meeting of the Middlesex Law Association was held yesterday afternoon at the court house. The occasion of it was the death of Judge Street. Mr. Richard Bayly occupied the chair, and Mr. G. N. Weekes acted as secretary.

The bar resolved to attend the funeral in a body and the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

"The members of the Middlesex Law Association desire to place on record the feelings of deep sorrow with which they received the intelligence of the death of the late Hon. Mr. Justice Street, many reasons combining to cause such feelings to exist.

"Having spent his life in this city of Toronto, he was well and most favorably known, not only to the members of our profession, but to the citizens at large, who held him in great respect and esteem.

"He was a member of this association from its formation until he removed from the city, for many years one of the trustees and treasurer, and was always ready and willing with his time and good counsel to assist in promotion of the welfare of our profession.

"While regretting his removal from this section, as it severed our connection with one of the members of the bar here with whom we were pleased to practice because of his ability, fairness and integrity, still we were pleased when he was appointed to the position of judge of the supreme court of judgment for Ontario, as we felt confident that his removal was one which would be advantageous and beneficial for the administration of justice in the Province, and we are pleased to know that our confidence was not misplaced as he brought to bear in the discharge of his onerous duties a well grounded knowledge of law, an even temper, patient and courteous manner, a careful, studious consideration of all matters brought before him and a strong, conscientious and honest mind.

"We desire to convey to his bereaved widow and family our deepest sympathy in this their time of irreparable bereavement by the removal of a loving and true husband and kind and indulgent father."

Tribute From Judge MacMahon.

A warm tribute was paid in the vacation single court at Toronto yesterday morning by Mr. Justice MacMahon to the late Mr. Justice Street.

"In the discharge of his duties," said he, "the bench and the bar have sustained a loss which arouses general regret. I had known the late Mr. Justice Street for over 35 years, and as a fellow townsman and personal friend, I feel deeply the loss of a man who was a much beloved judge."

RECOMMENDS \$500 GRANT

Board of Works Again Acts on Rowing Club's Request.

The board of works, at its regular meeting last night, again considered the question of a grant to the London Rowing Club to assist in building a breakwater to prevent damage from further damage by spring floods. The club claims that the erection of the West London breakwater and the great amount of filling in the rear of the Scarrow property have diverted the course of the river to such an extent as to greatly damage the Rowing Club grounds.

Messrs. Edmund Weld, J. S. McDougall and J. D. Tylor appeared last night, on behalf of the club, and asked the city to make the desired grant. Mr. Weld stated that it was his opinion that the city was liable, and he added, unless the city meets the club fairly in the matter, there is reason to believe that an action will be brought to compel it to do so.

On motion of Ald. Garratt, the council will be recommended to make a grant of \$500.
