MASSACRE IN ROUMANIA; JEWS OF TOWN WIPED OUT

Dispatch to New York Tells of a Terrible Three-Days' Slaughter and Pillage.

New York, March 18 .- The cable dispatch received last night by the Jewish Morning Journal of this city, reporting that terrible massacres have occurred at Podihilo, Roumania, has caused consternation among the Roumanian Jews in New York. They fear another Kishiniff affair, in which so many Russian Jews perished. Podihilo is only about 30 miles from Kishiniff, which is in Bessarabia, across the Russian frontier. All of the Roumanian societies in New York have been notified to attend a mass meeting tonight in the Manhattan Lyceum in the heart of the east side Ghetto. The best measures that can be taken to aid the afflicted at Podihilo are to be discussed and decided upon. The cablegram received here announcing the massacre was signed, according to the recipients, by three leading merchants of Podihilo. The cablegram follows:

"Terrible massacre since last Thursday; town totally destroyed. All the lewish population are ruined and houses pillaged. We ask help."



WEATHER NOTES.

Huge Ice Jam at Bridge Piled Fifteen Feet High

Tremendous Head of Water From North Cleared Channel, and Trouble Was Averted.

The ice in both the north and south branches of the river has disappeared. The river shows a rise of three feet today, but this is looked upon as away below the ordinary spring flood, and while West Londoners felt all along that the breakwater offered them protection from the river, they are very much pleased that the ice is gone and that the chances of trouble for the suburb have been thereby very much reduced.

For several hours yesterday the people of West London watched the movements of the river with interest. On Saturday night the ice in the north

branch began to move, and soon it was ouring down toward the forks. THEY'RE ALL WELL, TOO street bridge, however, the river was filled te its bed with slush ice, which had floated down at New Years, and had frozen there. In some places it was ten feet

Piled Fifteen Feet High.

There was not much water in the river when the movement of the ice began, and when the latter struck the ice below the dam a huge jam was formed. All Sunday morning the ice came down in a steady procession, and in places below the dam was piled up fifteen feet high. Finally the water began to rise, and

then trouble was feared. The ice on the west side of the river rose to within four feet of the top of the breakwater in places, and those standing on the bank could see the river rising at the rate of three inches Saunby mill race was open, however, and
