Raisin Creams.

Mix a cup of English walnut meat (chopped), a teaspoon of vanilla, a pinch of salt, a cup of chopped and seeded raisins, 2 pounds of condensed confectioner's sugar. Mix to a stiff paste with cream and roll on a sugar board in a layer half an inch thick. Cut in squares.

Warfare on Files.

Dear Miss Grey.—Have been very much interested in your page for some time and since it is nearing fly season decided to offer a little suggestion that may be of some use to those housewives who have to make constant warfare on the flies.

I found tanglefoot better than any other kind of fly paper, but so many accidents occurred when the sheets were spread around anywhere, that I invented a plan, which works like a charm.

Provide yourself with five plain pins, a piece of wrapping twine six or eight inches long, on each end of which you make a knot with a small loop, also a circle of yellow wrapping paper six inches across. Now take your single sheet of tanglefoot—roll it lengthwise, and on one end pin your circle of

wrapping paper in three places, leaving a fringe—then pin your string to the other end by its loops and your tanglefoot is ready to be hung from the ceiling from a hooked pin or any other object out of reach, and the cup-shaped paper on the bottom catches any sticky drops liable to fall.
