Haig Reports Strong Positions Being Placed To Stop Expected Heavy Attack To Save Cambrai-Enemy Brings Troops From Russia and Italy, But Tommy Gives Fritz No Rest.

There is evidence that the enemy troops have been hurried from Russia, and even from Italy, to try to restore the situation around Cambrai. The weather continues favorable for the troops, and transport is able to move fairly easily.'
