**NORMAL SCHOOL**
EXAM RESULTS

Following are the results of the examinations held recently at the Normal School. The certificates of the successful candidates and the marks of those who failed will be forwarded in due course to the individual addresses. Candidates who failed to obtain the necessary standing for interim second-class certificates but whose marks bring them within the provisions of section 22 (2) of the Normal School syllabus will be granted limited third-class certificates, valid for five years, and upon passing the final examination at a Normal School not later than 1921 will be granted interim second-class certificates. Such candidates will be advised of the subjects which they must re-write.

Those candidates who have failed to obtain standing will be required to attend another session, but they may enter at the reopening of the Normal schools in January and complete their examinations in June.

LIBERAL MEMBERS

BACKING UP DEWART

ON RADIALS ISSUE

TORONTO, July 13.—Thirteen Liberal members of the Ontario Legislature attended a conference here today on the hydro-electric radial railway question. They approved of a statement issued by H. Hartley Dewart, K.C., M.P., Liberal leader in Ontario, last week to the effect that the provincial hydro-electric commission should be re-organized with five members instead of three as at present, and that Hon. I. B. Lucas, former attorney-general, should not be retained on the hydro commission. They approved of Mr. Dewart's claim that if the hydro commission were reorganized it would not be necessary for the Government to appoint a royal commission to investigate the hydro radial situation. Confidence in the leadership of Mr. Dewart was expressed by the meeting in a resolution.

PLATFORM OF THIRD

PARTY TO INCLUDE

IRISH RECOGNITION

CHICAGO, July 13.—Unable to get a report for its platform committee, the New party convention adjourned at 10:30 o'clock tonight. Platform and selection of candidates will be the order of business tomorrow morning.

Leaders of the New party, born today, were striving desperately tonight to solidify the strength of the minor groups, from which it came into unified political power.

Early moments of the New party's life were fraught with menacing situations. The joint chairman of the Labor and the Committee of Forty-Eight battled for hours to keep the jealousies and distrust of the rival groups submerged, and the road open for the transaction of business.

Peacemakers Called.

Several times in the long-drawn-out afternoon session a break appeared not far away. Peacemakers were called to the platform several times, and by their appeals to the common aims of the delegates staved off, at least temporarily, the movement toward a break.

While the convention argued over the recognition extended its various elements under the amiable, the platform committee completed a draft of nine planks. According to members of the platform committee, the platform desires of several groups have been ignored in the draft.

Recognition of Ireland and Soviet

Russia and a league of nations to "the end that all kings and wars be abolished," were included in the platform.

Other planks covered a soldiers' bonus and steeply graduated income tax, democratic control of industry by the workers, and public ownership and operation of public utilities and natural resources.

The remaining planks were devoted to reduction of the cost of living, increased production, promotion of agricultural prosperity, and a bill of rights for labor.

TO CONTEST SEATS

OF NEW MINISTERS

Three-Cornered Fights Likely

in Three Maritime Ridings.

OTTAWA, July 13.—(Canadian Press)

—Present information here leads to the expectation at Liberal headquarters that when the necessary by-elections are held in the Maritime Provinces, through the introduction of new blood into the cabinet, with the inclusion of Hon. F. B. McMurtry, Hon. E. W. Wigmore, and Hon. E. K. Spinney, there will be a Liberal candidate named to contest every seat opened—Clochester and Yarmouth, N. S., and St. John, N. B.

During the past few months there has also been great activity among the United Farmers of the Maritime Provinces in getting an organization together, similar to that of the three Prairie Provinces, and it is being prophesied that there will be one or more three-cornered fights.

Cap When It Exploded.

ST. MARYS, July 13.—Bert Gordon, nine-year-old son of David Gordon, Thomas street, had the fingers of one hand blown off and one leg and the side of his face lacerated yesterday by the explosion of a dynamite cap with which he was playing. It is reported that a number of dynamite caps were recently stolen from the Thomas Quarry Company's explosive shed and it is supposed that the injured lad found some of these caps.

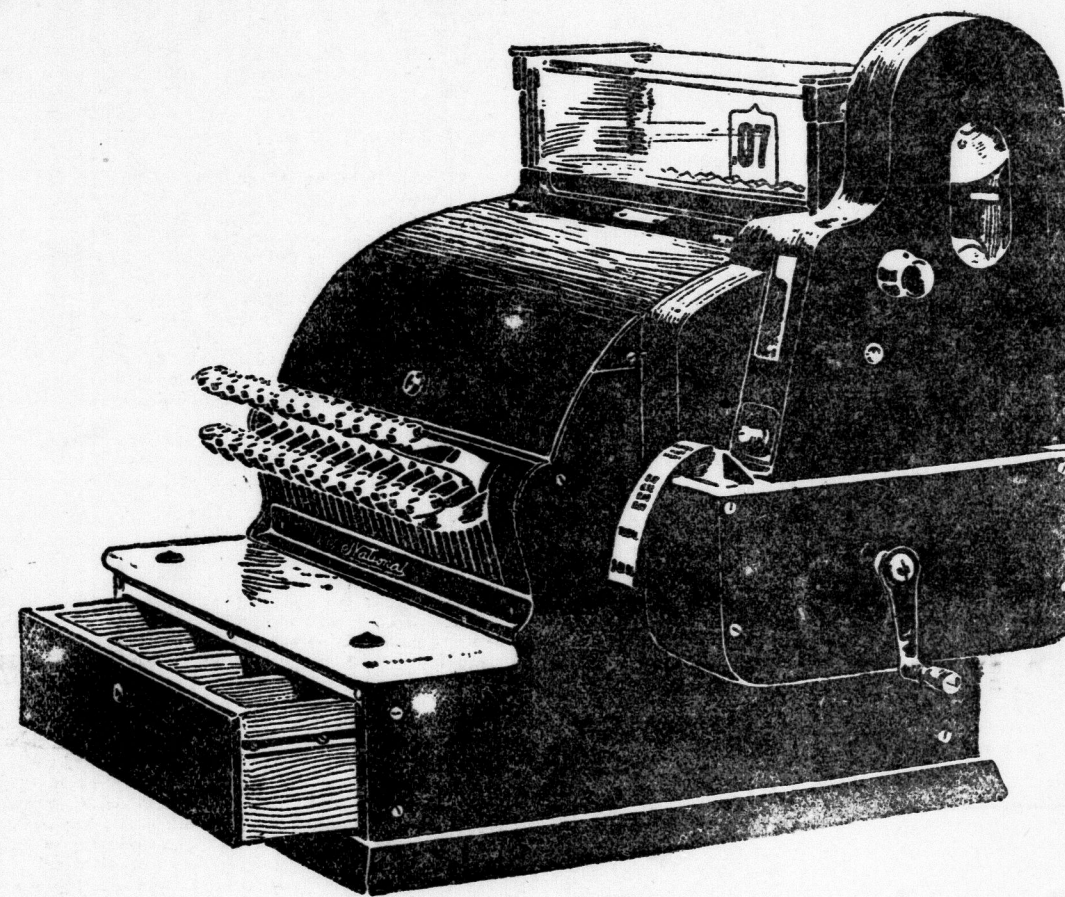
