Current Loans Decrease But Deposit Figures Jump

Bank Statement For November Issued by Department of Finance Shows Shrinkage in Current Loan Total For Month and Swelling Deposit Totals.

OTTAWA, Dec. 23.—(Canadian Press).—A shrinkage in current loans in Canada from \$1,405,401,227 to \$1,353,973,118 is a feature of the bank statement for November issued today by the department of finance. Current loans outside Canada also fell away from \$12,747,657 to \$11,857,059 in November. Notice deposits jumped from \$1,271,275,751 to \$1,292,009,095. Other figures indicate a gradual tightening up in business conditions.

HOPE FOR SOLUTION OF GREEK PROBLEM IS VOICED BY GOVT.

Speech From Throne at Proroguing of British Parliament Hopes Powers Will Reach Settlement of Question—Also Looks To Early Resumption of Trade With Russia—Deplores Violence in Ireland.

LONDON, Dec. 23.—The speech from the throne on the occasion of the proroguing of Parliament at midnight to-night after referring to the friendly relations with foreign powers, alluded to the Greek difficulty, and declared that the Government would, in conjunction with the Allies, endeavor to reach a solution compatible with their joint responsibilities.

LARGER GAS MAINS TO BE LAID; CITY TO ISSUE DEBENTURES

Sanction of Railway Board Granted For Improvement of Equipment.

ST. THOMAS, Dec. 23.—The city council was given permission yesterday afternoon by the Provincial Municipal and Railway Board to pass a bylaw for the issue of debentures to the extent of \$50,000, to be applied to the improvement of the gas mains throughout the city. CHARTER APPLIED FOR BY TRANSIT COMPANY FOR \$30,000,000 BRIDGE

If Bill is Passed West Will Be Started Next Fall

WINDSOR, Dec. 23.—With the formal announcement today of plans to introduce through W. C. Kennedy, Liberal member of the House for North Essex, a bill authorizing a charter to the Canadian Transit Company, came the announcement that work on the construction of the huge \$30,000,000 international bridge between Detroit and Windsor, over the Detroit River, and linking up Canada and the United States.

The proposed Canadian Transit Company will, if the bill passes, have capital stock of \$30,000,000 and will have powers to construct, maintain and operate a traffic bridge and railway lines across the Detroit River from point at or near Windsor to Detroit.

The plan is to make it a thoroughly public enterprise with the public invited to subscribe stocks. Under the proposed charter the company will be empowered to acquire and hold lands for the bridge, railway tracks, terminal yards, etc. Power would also be given to construct 20 miles of rail lines for connecting purposes. The company asks for the right to expropriate lands, valuation to be fixed by arbitration. The bridge will be constructed on a toll basis. Provision will be made to finance the project through the railways.

The work is to be done jointly by Canadian and American capital. A bill providing for the incorporation of an American company is also being introduced in Detroit. The provisional directors of the Canadian company include Mr. Healy, W. J. Pulling, Charles Fowler, bridge engineer, Wallace R. Campbell, Mayor B. Winter of Windsor; Mayor C. S. King, Walter McGee, and Frank Lieut.-Col. W. L. McGregor and Frank Joyce.

A Public Enterprise. "This is to be a thoroughly public enterprise," Mr. Healy told The Advertiser. "The provisional directors are giving their services entirely free, and we are spending a great deal of our own money in preliminary arrangements. The years of investigation we are absolutely certain that the bridge will pay for itself from the time it is opened. The matter has been very thoroughly gone into, and the plans are ready. We estimate that it will take five years to construct the bridge, and that if our plans carry satisfaction, work can be commenced next fall. There will be no cash stock for the provisional directors. They will be treated just the same as the others when the time comes to issue stock. We will be glad to give out further details later."

The American company is being formed on similar lines to the Canadian organization. When arranged, the two companies will combine in selling the necessary securities.

FOUR GEESSE AND A FEW CHRISTMAS TREES MAKE MARKET—POULTRY PRICES A LITTLE FIRMER.

Because today was not a regular market day, little produce of any kind was offered. The Christmas market was held on Thursday, and the majority of the active Christmas trading was carried on then. Four geese and a few Christmas trees made up the market this morning. The large supplies of fowl on Thursday somewhat eased the demand in the morning, but late in the afternoon became brisk again. The small supplies at this time prices became a little firmer. Turkeys appeared in small quantities, but no other line of poultry, and with this condition prices advanced to 60c per lb. for the best quality of geese. Geese sold for 32c and 35c per lb. retail and 30c per lb. wholesale. There was a demand for geese on Thursday. Chickens have not been in very good demand this year, but prices were advanced to 10c per lb. for the best quality of chickens. Live and dressed turkeys are in good demand, and prices are advanced to 10c per lb. for the best quality of turkeys. But the demand was not filled. This condition did not advance prices any. The poultry market will remain in good demand for the remainder of the year.
