Current Loans Decrease But Deposit Figures Jump

Bank Statement For November Issued by Department of Finance Shows Shrinkage in Current Loan Total For Month and Swelling Deposit Totals.

OTTAWA, Dec. 23.—(Canadian Press.)—A shrinkage in current loans in Canada from \$1,405,401,227 to \$1,359,973,118 is a feature of the bank statement for November issued today by the department of finance. Current loans outside Canada also fell away from \$193,749,657 in October, to \$169,677,659 in November. Notice deposits jumped from \$1,271,275,751 to \$1,292,009,008. Other figures indicate a gradual tightening up in business conditions.

OTTAWA WILL NOT REDEEM CANCELLED LUXURY TAX STAMPS

OTTAWA, Dec. 23. — (By Canadian ress.) — The Government will not Press.)—The Government will not redeem any cancelled luxury tax stamps but only those entirely unusued and uncancelled. This was stated in a circular being issued today by the department of inland revenue, instructing merchants of inland revenue, instructing merchants how they may secure refunds.

Merchants are instructed to make out a list showing the total number of uncancelled and unused stamps of each denomination in their possession and add up the same in money value. The list should then be forwarded to the local collector of customs who will in turn forward it to the taxation office at the capital. When these returns are verified checks will be issued to the merchants.

a bill authorizing a charter to the Canadian Transit Company, came the announcement that work would be commenced next fall on the construction of the huge \$30,000,000 international bridge between Windsor and Detroit over the Detroit River, and linking up Canada and the United States.

Terms of Charter.

The proposed Canadian Transit Company will, if the bill passes, have a capital stock of \$30,000,000, and will have powers to construct, maintain and operate a traffic bridge and railway lines across the Detroit River from a point at or near Windsor to Detroit. The plan is to make it a thoroughly public enterprise with the public invited to subscribe stocks. Under the proposed charter the company would be empowered to acquire and hold lands for the bridge, railway tracks, terminal yards, etc. Power would also be given to construct 20 miles of rail lines for connecting purposes. The company asks for the right to expropriate necessary lands, valuation to be fixed by arbitration. The bridge will be constructed on a toll basis. Provision will be made for four railway tracks, steam and electric, All railway companies will have access to the bridge, and no attempt will be made to finance the project through the railways.


