Light Apple Crop.

OTTAWA, Aug 4.—Alex. McNeill, chief of the fruit division of the department of agriculture, states that there is a continued decrease in the quantity of apples thruout the whole Dominion, except in British Columbia, where an increase is registered. The reason given is that a series of good crops has exhausted the trees, altho the late frosts have been a contributing cause. Winter apples are mostly affected, and early Snow's report on his own estimate of acreage indicates 75,000,000 bushels wheat for Minnesota; 23,000,000 bushels for North Dakota, and 25,000,000 bushels for South Dakota. On basis of government acreage and usually accepted figure for par, his report indicates Minnesota 69,000,000 bushels; North Dakota 36,000,000 bushels; and South Dakota 42,000,000 bushels, or a total of 147,000,000 bushels.

Crops Need Rain.

The Price Current says: Occasional showers have failen over the central region during the past week, which have proved beneficial to the growing corn, but have tended to retard threshing and haying to some extent. Over the greater part of this area there is still a deficiency of moisture, and while the general condition at this time is not critical, good soaking rains badly needed to maintain the present prospect of the crops. As the threshing of winter wheat progresses the crop seems to be turning out in volume up to anticipation, both as to quality and quantity of the grain. Reports from the spring wheat region fail to show any improvement in the general condition of the crop. Harvesting has begun and this work will be general within a few days.

Thirteen Strike-Breakers Arrested.
