## What Would Be a Fair War Tax on Our Gold Mines

In his "Gold Mines of the World," J. H. Curle considers the status of mines as compared with those corporations whose ousiness involves the use, but not the exhaustion, of their capital. The book was published before the South African War, after a careful examination of the principal gold mines in the British Empire. It may be said in passing that last year only \$171,000,000 out of a total gold production of \$471,000,000 came from foreign countries, and Canada's share of this great aggregate was barely \$20,000,000.

The mines of the Rand are regarded by Mr. Curle as the greatest of which history has any record. But capital is very cautious. It demands big profits and very moderate risks, and there is no doubt that the special war tax will tend to check the development of our mineral resources.

To show the vast importance of mining we need only instance our ruthless enemy. It is certain that Germany would be unable to prosecute this colossal war had it not been for the extraordinary progress of her coal and iron mines within the past 40 years. The same factors made Britain the workshop of the world by the middle of the last century. Mining is a great source of wealth and strength to any nation. It is a basic industry no less than agriculture. But it requires much Mining Corp 32 more capital, and it involves greater taks. It needs encouragement, particuarly in Canada, for our annual production is not one-tenth of that of the United States. And in the precious metals, at all events, we have an unlimited field, and deposits probably greater than those of the neighboring republic.

Mr. Curle's examinations of the gold mines of the world were made as representative of The Economist, London, England. His work commands the condence of financial and mining men the world over. It fixes the basis on which mines can appeal to investors on an equal footing with industrial and financial corporations whose operations do not necessarily involve any impairment of capital.

If the best mines of the Rand should return at least 15 per cent. to provide for redemption of capital and interest thereon, it seems reasonable that capital in vested in our improved fields should be allowed at least 20 per cent., the special tax of 25 per cent. to apply only on the xcess. The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lanus Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lanus Agency (out not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within mine miles of his nomestead on a farm of at least 30 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may, pre-empt a quartergood standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price
