SOLDIER HEROES BACK FROM FRANCE

Of Fifty-Seven Returning, Eighteen Have Lost Limbs.

JACK MUNRO ARRIVES

Brings With Him Dog Mascot of Famous Princess Pats.

Two parties of invalided soldiers arrived in Toronto yesterday morning, after "doing their bit" on the battlefields of France. The first party, consisting of 18 amputation cases, men who had lost a leg or an arm, or, as in two instances, both legs, arrived at the Union Station at 7 a.m. In the second party, which came in two hours later, were 39 more war heroes, all more or less severely wounded. All the returned soldiers were met at the station by relatives, and members of the Dominion Hospitals Commission and the Voluntary Aid Committees. Three ambulances, a hospital wagon, motor cars and special street cars were provided to transport the soldiers from the depot to the Spadina Military Hospital.

One of the most prominent among yesterday's arrivals was Pte. "Jack" Munro, a heavy-weight boxer, who once fought the famous C. E. F., was prior to joining the C. E. F., was mayor of Elk River, Ontario. His once strong right arm was paralyzed by a shrapnel bullet which struck his should-

er. Along with Jack Munro came a fine collie dog, "Robbie Burns," official mascot of the Princess Pats. When Munro had boarded the boat to return to Canada he missed the dog, and going ashore, hunted two days in Liverpool before he found it. By that time his ship had sailed and he had to wait until another passage was arranged.

Among the amputation cases were those of two soldiers who had lost both legs: Lance-Corp. J. C. Weddell of Preston and Pte. Christian Neilson of Winnipeg. Corp. Weddell was walking down a street in Fleurbaix, France, when a large explosive shell burst in front of him, blowing his legs almost clean off his body. Pte. Neilson received his wounds also by a shell explosion at Mametz. Both of these war heroes smiled and took delight in fringing their special armchairs along the hospital corridor.

At the Somme, Pte. Henry Johnston was accidentally run down by one of the famous "tanks." His giant wheels, as they swept over him, took off his left arm and leg. His home is at 21 Pryor avenue.

POSTPONED INDEFINITELY.

CANADIAN SOLDIERS HAPPY IN SWITZERLAND'S CAMPS

After visiting her husband, Sergt. Joseph Cameron, who is interned in Switzerland as a prisoner of war, Mrs. Cameron, 156 Blackthorne avenue, has returned to Toronto. Sergt. Cameron, a member of the 15th Battalion, was taken prisoner at St. Julien, April 24, 1915, and was transferred to Murren, Switzerland, last August.

Mrs. Cameron found Canadian prisoners in "Switzerland" in the best of spirits, and glad to have been exchanged to Switzerland from German camps, where scarcity of food caused hardships. Sergt. Cameron was in Göttingen, and there six surgeons operated on his car. The hearing was lost, however.

Mrs. Cameron visited the place of her birth in Scotland on her return trip. She said the war's effect was considerably more noticeable there than in Canada. Sergt. Cameron was formerly an employee of the T. Eaton Co.

LEGISLATURE OPENS FEBRUARY THIRTEEN

Premier Hearst Makes Announcement—Adjourn Out of Respect for Late Members.

The legislature will open on Tuesday, Feb. 13, Premier Hearst made the announcement yesterday. The opening on Tuesday will be purely formal. On Wednesday the premier will move adjournment of the house from respect to the members who have died since the last session. Hon. James S. Duff and Hon. J. J. Foy and S. Armstrong, M.L.A. On Thursday will come the address.

The premier said yesterday that he hoped the work of the session would be over by Easter. The nickel legislation he hoped, would be ready early in the session.

STRACHAN AVENUE PROPERTY IS LEASED TO PROVINCIAL HYDRO

The parks committee yesterday unanimously agreed to lease to the Provincial Hydro Commission the land on Strachan avenue for a site for the enlarged power station. Three parcels of property are involved, and the leases will expire simultaneously in 1926. Rental is based on a value of \$5000 per acre.

Altho the committee favored Commissioner Chisholm's recommendation to operate Turner's lands at Hamilton's Point instead of leasing the concession, the matter was left over for future consideration.
