If your letter were to represent the final opinion of the British government, certain regretable conclusions would seem to follow. It would seem to imply autocratic interference on the part of the government with the free communication of friendly peoples. It would check for the moment a modest but sincere effort toward the formation of international public opinion which could be made to focus upon problems which threaten the peace of the world.

"The commission will continue its work in conformity with its original purpose, it cannot but hope that both in England and in Ireland there will be a full understanding of its friendly purposes, as each day's events make more evident the tragic possibilities.


