

Even Staunch West Zorra Can't Stand It Farmers Show Which Way Wind's Blowing

Old-Timers Who Never Voted Tory in a Lifetime Announce Themselves for Wallace—Editor of St. Mary's Argus Cornered—Confesses Antagonism to Provincial Rights.

Woodstock, June 3.—(Special.)—Farmers' day gave a decided impetus to the North Oxford campaign and the politicians were busy. Never before in the history of this Liberal riding has the path of a liberal candidate been so strewn with difficulties. Even W. Zorra is up to arms. There are only 59 Conservative votes in the township, but if the men of Zorra vote as they talk, there will be a slump in the fortunes of the candidate, who, tho a Liberal, is out against provincial rights. One of the staid old farmers of Zorra is so enthusiastic that he came into the Conservative committee rooms this morning to unbind himself.

"The Conservatives will get a bigger vote in North Oxford than they ever got," he observed with a twinkle in his eye, which seemed to say "Wallace for mine."

In order to test the feeling of the farmers, The World circulated among them on the market. It was remarkable the change of sentiment that was evidenced and, the outspoken independence of the solid men of the townships. One of the city officials was approached. He never gave a Conservative vote in his life.

"I'm going to vote for Wallace and I'm proud to say so," he told The World. He added that he knew many who had declared themselves in like manner to him.

"Just so long," he said, "as Sir Wilfrid Laurier proposes to deny the Northwest its right to control its own school system I will vote against him."

Lots of Them.

Capt. McKay of West Zorra is a representative Liberal. He said, to-day he had been a Liberal all his life, but could not vote against provincial rights.

To-day a Woodstock Liberal who had decided to oppose Smith received a letter from R. T. Crawford, a former Woodstock Liberal committee worker, now living at Edmonton, N.W.T., imploring his friends here not to support the candidate who stands for the iniquity Sir Wilfrid Laurier is fastening on the west. Does the west care? Crawford says it does.

Dr. McLaughlin, a most pronounced Liberal, is most active in his opposition to the autonomy bill.

And the list could be extended. Scores of prominent individuals could be named who are most actively engaged in this campaign, but on the side of the representative of a party to which they have always been opposed.

Working Hard.

The best evidence, however, that North Oxford cares is the immense efforts being put forth by a swarm of government orators and cabinet ministers who find it necessary in a by-election in a riding where three out of every four voters are Liberals to hold two or three meetings every night in an effort to turn the tide of popular approval in their favor.

Another indication of the feeling is the enthusiasm with which the Conservative speakers are being received in strongholds of Liberalism throughout the county. At Ferguson in the township of Blanford, J. E. Armstrong, M.P., spoke last night and the feature of the meeting was the appearance of M. J. Overholt, a Justice of the Peace, who said he had been a reformer all his life but was going to take an independent stand this time. He made a strong appeal to the audience to vote independent of party on this occasion.

At another meeting at Martin's School House last night, the Baptist minister of the place was chairman. His liberalism has never been open to question and when he declared that under no circumstance would he again vote the Liberal ticket so long as the Liberal Party refused to grant provincial rights to the new provinces, he was met with a storm of applause.

Could Not Dodge.

The editor of the St. Mary's Argus, Mr. Dillon, was given the opportunity of defending the Government, but he made it stronger for the Conservative candidate. One of the speakers, E. R. Purvis, asked him one embarrassing question, namely, "Are you for or against provincial rights for the Northwest Territories?"

Dillon sought to dodge but Purvis nailed him and he finally replied: "I am against provincial rights and I am for separate schools, as set forth in clause 16."

The audience jeered and hissed. Liberals as well as Conservatives taking part in the demonstration against the St. Mary's editor. It was 12:20 when

the meeting broke up and most of the audience stayed till the finish. Another Conservative meeting at Lakeside was largely attended and enthusiastic.

"Are these signs of the times? Can it be that West Zorra is wavering in its allegiance to Liberal principles or is West Zorra standing firm and the Liberal Party breaking away?"

One is reminded of the Scotchman, who, in 1812, when the Americans were threatening the border shook his head and exclaimed, "Weel they may tak Canada, but they'll no tak Zorra."

It almost looks as if Zorra was about to be captured.

EVERY PROSPECT PLEASES.

Weather Conditions Favor Bumper Western Crop.

Winnipeg, June 3.—(Special.)—With warm, dry weather, conditions have been ideal during the past week for bringing on wheat, and nearly every district reports perfect prospects for a bumper crop. Nothing was needed after the heavy rains, but such weather, and the growth is accordingly strong and forward, considering early checks, while light frosts of the previous week appear to have done no serious damage. Certain districts in Southern Manitoba, where the land is light, can stand no more rain immediately but another week's hot sunshine can but have a beneficial effect on the wheat crop generally. Making most of the fine weather, while the wheat crop is in the early stages of progress during the past week with coarse grain crops, barley, oats and peas, seeding being nearly completed with excellent prospects. The wheat area seeded will be considerably increased over that of last year, while the grain will hold their own. The crop, however, is reduction in flax acreage, owing to a bad season last year.

Owing to high prices obtaining thru the winter, considerable activity is being shown in market gardening, especially around Winnipeg, where an enormous influx of population creates a demand difficult to supply offering splendid opportunities to market gardeners with a little capital and enterprise, tho the expenses for good storage cellars are exceptionally heavy.

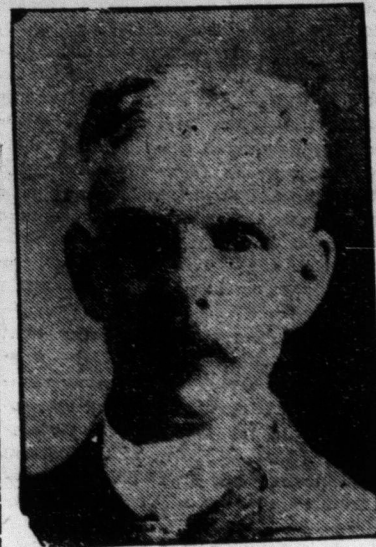
The following resolution was passed defining the general principles upon which the residences will be established and conducted:

HAULTAIN COMING EAST IN LONDON ON TUESDAY

Northwest Premier in Winnipeg
Declares Western Sentiment is Undoubted.

Winnipeg, June 3.—(Special.)—F. W. G. Haultain, Premier of the Northwest Territories, will take active part in the election campaigns in London and North Oxford. He reached this city today on the train from the west and will reach London Tuesday night, on which occasion he is to speak at a political meeting.

When seen by your correspondent, Haultain declared that there was a very real sentiment in the west against the autonomy bills, instancing the manner in which the Liberals of Calgary had evidenced their dissatisfaction by dropping the petition against M. S. McCarthy, M.P., while the Liberal Association at Indian Head has passed a resolution condemning the educational clause. Mr. Haultain foreshadowed his probable course in future, as follows:

"I do not think that the bills creating provinces will be ready by July 1, so that Regina's celebration will have to be postponed. The date will have to be arranged to suit the passing of the bills. With reference to my own movements, I have not made any definite decision, except that I will enter into political life in one of the new provinces, but which one I cannot say yet."

"I will be a candidate for the legislature. My opposition to features of the autonomy bills which I have fought so far will be continued."

WIRE IN OUTFOOTED CLAUDE GET-AWAY DAY AT WOODBINE

Monte Carlo, St. Joseph and Moonraker Favorites; Wire In, R'sing Sun and War Paint Second Choices, Were the Winners.

Favorites in three races in a row at Woodbine Park and then the next three were beaten. Wire In out-footed Claude all round in the Waterloo Handicap. The weight and distance was too much for Conover in the steeplechase that Rising Sun won in a stretch won from Amur, with Thornhedge third and the favorite next.

The day was fine and warm and the trade fast. It was a genuine Saturday crowd, about 8,000, and every horse regardless of the odds was backed.

In the first race Hyperion took up the running from the break lapped by Monte Carlo, with Pat Bulger third, and Albert leading the bunch through the back and eastern stretches. Monte Carlo came away at rounding the turn and won in a gallop. Pat Bulger came fast with Darry through the stretch for the place and show.

In the race for the Pyro Stakes the Maupin entry, T. S. Martin and Judge White, led the van in the back stretch, with St. Joseph sticking close. Down the eastern run St. Joseph went into second place, and turned home a nose behind Martin and going away. It was the three horses through the stretch, and a hard drive home resulted, in which St. Joseph won handily enough by a length. Judge White made a fast finish, and lost the place to T. S. Martin by a short nose.

Crestfallen got away first in the Dominion Handicap with Chateleine a half last. The pace maker, Crestfallen, set a fast gain with Moonraker, Will King close second, Loupania third, Lily King fourth and War Whoop and Chateleine lapped last down the western and back stretches. Moonraker made a bid in the eastern run and drew up on Crestfallen, turning to the home stretch first by a neck, and winning from there home easily by a length. Loupania and War Whoop were improving their position in the eastern run and Kirkfield horse made a driving finish home with Will King, both beating out Y Loupania.

The favorite was beaten in the Waterloo Handicap. They know just how to beat Daley's blues at the Woodbine. Wire In, tho off on the outside was moving early enough to cross over, and take the lead. He made a killing pace, and Claude had to chuck it at the betting stand after he passed the 2 mile runner Elie. The entry was backed for even money to 4 to 5 and it all went to the toots.

A fine field faced the starter in the Steeplechase Handicap with Canour the public choice. He was off behind the bunch and looked good; the second time round when Thornhedge showed the way. Olinet ran out leaving the double jump first time and Gilmore was next to drop out. Gearholm splashes thru the water jump second time round and later unseated Lynch. Rising Sun, Amur and Thornhedge fought it out at two miles and they finished safely that way, Canour fourth, and Mabon fifth.

The favorite ran third in the Consolation Purse, that was won by the trick War Paint with Maurice Donovan's Yama Christy second.

A pleasant feature of the afternoon was the presentation to Mrs. Fraser, wife of the popular secretary treasurer of the D. J. L., with a silver tea service beautifully lined in satin.
