CHURCHES IN ANNUAL MEETING

Leinster Street Baptist and Congregational Reports for the Year

The annual business meeting of the Leinster street church was held last evening with the pastor, Rev. W. Camp, B. D., occupying the chair. SHOOT TWO SCHOOLBOYS AS THEY ARE PLAYING

New York, Jan. 12.—A black-bearded man, wearing a black slouch hat drew his automatic pistol from his long coat this afternoon and fired five shots into a crowd of Harlem school boys who had been taunting him. Robert Lomas, six years old, was shot through the heart and died instantly. Arthur Shively, also six years, was shot through the left lung and was taken to a hospital critically wounded.
The man in black, whom none of the frightened youngsters can describe accurately, stumbled off into the bushes and rocks surrounding the boys' playground and was soon lost to sight. One hundred dollars was offered for his capture.

SAY GATES IS BEHIND CANADIAN SMELTER PLAN

Chicago, Jan. 12.—John W. Gates of this city, the well-known "wire and rail" man, and who is also president of the Moose Mountain Iron Company is behind the powerful syndicate of United States and German capitalists which has in view the erection in the vicinity of Toronto, (Ont.) of large and modern smelters, requiring the expenditure of several millions of dollars.
The plans for the proposed smelters are now being prepared. The new corporation expects to have its principal revenues from the Cobalt and Porcupine fields.

Newspaper Ready Soon—Connection to G.T.P. Liquor Case

Fredericton, N. B., Jan. 12.—Charles LaBell was convicted before Commissioner Farnis at McGivney's today on charge of appealing and demanding a copy of the prohibited list of the Transcontinental, and was fined \$50 and costs. The case was tried ex parte and at its conclusion LaBell appealed and demanded a copy of the proceedings.
Fred Ogilvy, employed as a conductor on the construction train on the Transcontinental, had his left leg fractured today below the knee, while working near Cain's River. He was brought to the city this evening and admitted to the hospital.
