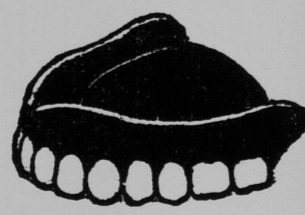

A CHALLENGE TO MARCONI. James S. Pitt, Formerly of St. John, Talks of His Wireless System.

Among the passengers arriving by the steamer Yale this morning was one gentleman who is particularly well known in St. John.

Although he is not anxious to discuss the merits of his invention at present, yet Mr. Pitt is convinced that he has improved upon the Marconi system.

Talking to the Times this morning he said he had ample backing and was prepared to challenge Signor Marconi for a competitive test of the two systems for some \$10,000 to \$20,000 per side.

Professor Pitt is accompanied by his brother, T. S. Pitt, eye and ear specialist, of Boston, and Dr. Charles Pitt, surgeon-dentist of Cambridge, Mass.

HIGH TREASURER'S REPORT The report of the high treasurer, E. P. Eastman, showed receipts of \$402.18; expenditures, \$408.18; leaving cash balance of \$14. The cash on hand May 31st, 1906, had been \$148.78.

HIGH AUDITORS' REPORT In their report the high auditors, J. V. Russell and Thos. Murray, said: Our worthy secretary has held continuous office in the high court longer than any other brother in the order in any high court, and we have much pleasure in stating that at this audit we find his work in all departments to be of a most satisfactory condition, partitioned in a most efficient manner, and his books and accounts kept in an up-to-date manner.

We find total cash received by high secretary during the year ending 31st May last, and by him deposited in banks at St. John, Moncton and St. John the following amounts: Supplies, \$731.30; High court dues, \$459.98.

Balance on hand 31st May, 1906, 148.78; Paid out by treasurer during year, 4074.78; Leaving balance on hand at May 31, 1907, 1414.00.

HIS SISTER IS ANXIOUS Some doubt now exists as to yesterday morning's despatch which stated that M. E. O'Connor, the guard killed in the C. P. R. train wreck at Beiler, Ont., was a St. John man. The address of Mrs. P. Kane, of 4 Winter street, St. John, was found in his pockets and this gave the impression that he belonged here.

As a result of enquiries made by the C. P. R. it was learned that Mr. O'Connor was a son of Edwin A. O'Connor, of 1019 Seymour street, Vancouver. His pockets also contained a membership card issued by the Vancouver Council, 1081, Knights of Columbus.

Mrs. Kane has a brother in the west, named McDade, and could not account for the address found on the body. It is thought it may have been given to Mr. O'Connor by a friend in the event of his passing through St. John.

Mrs. Kane is well anxious about the matter. The first despatches on the wreck told of the death of M. E. O'Connor, the impression being that he was a Chinese, who were travelling on the wrecked train. On Saturday Mrs. Kane received a message from the C.P.R. office that her brother had been killed in the wreck. On asking the name, however, she found the dead man's name was John O'Connor. Her brother's name is John McDade, and he lived in Vancouver and, as a member of the police force, frequently conducted parties in Chinese. This she most gave up hope when told of the card bearing her name and address found in the dead man's pockets.

Superintendent Downie told her last evening that the man's name was undoubtedly O'Connor and therefore not her brother. She was also told that the dead man's father lived in Vancouver and resided in Seymour street. On hearing the name of the street Mrs. Kane almost immediately despaired, as it was on that street her brother had been living. Although unable to account for the difference in the names, Mrs. Kane, last night expressed the opinion that the dead man was her brother.

This morning she sent a telegram to her sister, Miss Rose McDade, who lives in Vancouver, and a reply will be awaited with great anxiety.

John McDade is well known here. He formerly conducted a business in Main street, but sold out and went to the Klondike nine years ago. Six years ago he was settled in Vancouver and joined the police force, sent for his sister, Miss Rose, to keep house for him. Mrs. Kane has heard from him occasionally and is fully aware that it is part of his business to escort one or more Chinese through the country.
