EVERY MAN NEEDED DESCRIBES CHARGE MADE BY CANADIANS
Letter From Earl of Buckingham to St. John Citizens—"In Tight Place But We Shall Win"—Praise For Canadians
Rupert Taylor, of Taylor Brothers, has received an interesting letter from the Earl of Buckingham from his home, Hampden House, Great Missenden, Bucks, England. After sympathizing with Mr. Taylor in the death of his father, the writer goes on to express his pleasure that the St. John man is again in the service, though as a soldier this time and not as a sailor, as you used to be.
"The old country and her colonies," he wrote, "are in a tight place and it will take us all our time to pull through. Every man is needed to do all that he can. We shall win, but it may take a long time and it must cost a terrible lot of lives and suffering. The Canadian troops have done magnificent work to the north of Ypres. The whole country is proud of them."

EVIDENCE IN CASE OF WALTON AND MENETT
The preliminary hearing in the case against William Walton, charged with assaulting and doing grievous bodily harm to George Menett, was commenced in the police court this morning. Mrs. Margaret Driscoll, sister of Menett, testified that on Saturday evening, May 15, she saw two men fighting in Landowne avenue, a short distance from her home. The man whom she did not then recognize as her brother was down and Walton, she said, was hitting him in the face, he also kicked him about the chest. She and her husband rushed out and begged Walton not to hit the man any more, and she said, he cried out repeatedly, "if any man slaps me I will kill him." She later saw Menett taken away by some soldiers.
Corporal Jack Redford told of being on duty at the magazine, when he heard a woman screaming. He went to investigate and was told to call out the guard as there was a woman being murdered. He saw two men fighting some distance away. One man was on the ground and the other, who was much larger, was kicking him and punching him in the face. He ordered the guard to interfere and also sent for an ambulance and the ambulance. When his men brought Menett to the camp, he said, the man was covered with blood and was in a terrible condition.
Doctor F. T. Dunlop told of dressing the wounds on the face and head of Menett. He said the man was badly beaten and ordered him to the hospital. He said he also dressed a wound on the shoulder of Walton. It was about one half inch deep and about the same length.
After the witnesses had been cross-questioned by Leonard A. Conlon, who is appearing for Walton, the latter was remanded. Menett is also under custody on a charge of slapping Walton with intent to do him grievous bodily harm.

SOUTH END LEAGUE OPENED
Victorias Have it Easy in First Game With Curlews
The South End Baseball League was opened last evening on the Barrack Square, when the Victorias, champions of 1914, decisively defeated the Curlews, 11 to 0. The official opening was witnessed in by Commissioner Potts, who threw the first ball over the plate, and the cheers of the assemblage and a merry tune played by the 28th rifle and drum band.
The Victorias took the field, and with Doyle pitching in good form, kept their opponents from scoring. The Curlews presented a weak line-up, as some of their best men were unable to attend. Heavy hitting featured the game, and at the close of the fourth inning the Victorias had tallied eleven times. The batsmen were—Victorias, Doyle and Gorman; Curlew, Harley and McDonald. More than 700 fans were in attendance, and, considering that it was the first game of the season, they apparently overlooked many of the errors, and were generous with applause when a good play was made by either side.
