Breeders stock cup (local bitches)—For best bitch and two of her get. (Bitch must have been owned by exhibitor both at time of service and on date dogs exhibited were whelped.) Dogs shown in this special class not necessarily owned by owner of the bitch.

Wm. and Robert Laskay cup for best rough coated terrier in the show. Peter McCaskey cup for best English bull bitch in the show.

H. J. Sheehan, cup for best wire fox terrier bred by exhibitor. Also other suitable prizes are offered for best setter, best pointer, Mr. Powers of Houlton, Me. offers for his special breed Irish terriers a \$100 cash prize, \$250 each for puppy, novice, limit and open.

WORLD TIME SPORT

A Great Horse Meet in Halifax In 1887

ENORMOUS CROWD. Between 5,000 and 6,000 People at Track—P. Clinch Rides Yorktown to Victory, Defeating Strabismus and His Horse Also Captures Another Event

The following is an account of a great racing meet which took place in Halifax on June 22, 1887, at which several St. John horsemen had entries. The meet was one of the best held in years and at that time created considerable interest throughout the maritime provinces and Maine. An account follows: The races at the riding grounds were the attraction of the afternoon. The crowd in attendance was enormous, and must have numbered between 5,000 and 6,000 people. It was intended that the inner enclosure would be kept free from the public, but the crowd became so great that the accommodation provided was too limited, and they had to be allowed in the centre of the field. Numerous vehicles of all descriptions were present, and the grand stand having a large number of ladies among its occupants. The stand enclosure contained quite a crowd, who made up many pools on the results, or took Fair Mutual tickets. The new grounds were much admired, especially by the large delegation of horsemen present from other towns.

The races were the best ever held, and afforded the keenest enjoyment. In each of the events, the winning animal conquered only after a hard struggle, and the open race was the best seen in these parts. A remarkable feature of the meeting was the small number of horses scratched from each event, the only one being Venture from all his races, and Strabismus from the Jubilee race. Mr. B. Daly officiated as judge; Lieut.-Col. Lane and Thomas Spelman as starters; Major Cuthbert as timekeeper, and H. McD. Henry, clerk of the course, each performing their duties most acceptably. The only complaint with the management was the long wait between the races, but this difficulty might be partly obviated, it is due in a great measure to time taken up in weighing, etc. Full particulars of the various races will be found in the following summary:

Strabismus again gained in the back stretch, and on the upper stretch his rider gathered him together for a final effort, and he came so strong and fast that there were hopes of his winning, but Yorktown continued his speed, and won quite handsily by a length and a half. Yorktown was a length and a half behind on his return to the stand. A protest was entered by Mr. Morrow on the ground that Yorktown crossed his horse at the upper turn on the first round. The judges reserved their decision.

Time, 1:29. A splendid start was effected and the large field kept well bunched together until the quarter pole, when they were strung out. At the quarter pole the Trump was leading, close by her, and General Babcock next. Hunchback was about four lengths away, and Nefeari, alongside. On the eastern side Honest Injun moved up on Stella and both soon collared the leader. Stella won by a neck, while the Trump was a length behind Injun, his rider holding him up when he seen he could not win.

Fourth Race. The Jubilee Purse—Value \$250. For all horses; one mile on the flat; weight for age. First \$175, 2nd, \$50; 3rd, \$25. P. Clinch's b. g. Yorktown, six years, 119 lbs. (Collins). 1. G. Wallis' (Hillsboro, N. B. m. Golden Maxine, six years, 119 lbs. (owner), ran unplaced. 2. W. McFarbridge's b. h. Emisary, length away from Yorktown. 3. 122 lbs. (Woods). 4. B. D. Woods, b. m. Touch-me-not, 117 lbs. (owner), was unplaced.

Time, 1:49.4. This was the great race of the day, bringing together four of the safest horses in the province. Golden Maxine seemed to be the favorite, and many were desirous of seeing her popular come to the front. Emisary had a host of admirers among city people, while Touch-me-not was well known by many, consequent on the well-known abilities of her rider, Yorktown, an hour previous, was the least thought of. They were soon got in position, and on the second attempt got away with Yorktown in front followed by Emisary and Maxine, with Touch-me-not two lengths in the rear. As is usual on these horses, but was tapped as soon as the horses start, but in other cities, this is the signal given to call the horses back. Collins, who rode Yorktown, pulled his horse back. At the turn Emisary was ahead, and two lengths to the good. Maxine drew out on the back stretch and soon showed in front. Yorktown was in third position and Touch-me-not close by him. They ran in these positions, passing the judges' stand, where Maxine drew ahead of Emisary, with the brown mare at his saddle girths. At the lower turn just a length separated one from the other. Touch-me-not commenced to draw up on the others, but Yorktown soon caused the greatest surprise by drawing out from behind, and stride by stride lessening the distance between him and the others. He gradually gained until he turned into the stretch, where he and Maxine had a great race. They came down towards the finish at a slashing pace, Yorktown finishing a length in advance. Emisary, which was cleverly ridden by C. Woods, and Touch-me-not, had a greater race for third, the former winning. Yorktown was ridden by a young lad named Collins, who rode with excellent judgment, and this together with his diminutiveness, made him an especial favorite. The race in all circumstances would be good, but considering the condition Yorktown ran the mile, it was extremely fast.
