ONDON, May 3 .- Premier Baldwin today told the L House of Commons that as a result of the order for a general strike at midnight tonight, the government finds it-

self challenged by an alternative government. The Premier declared that the labor leaders organizing the strike were threatening the basis of orderly government and were nearer to proclaiming civil war than Great Britain had been for centuries.

Further talking would be wrong, the Premier said, unless the government get immediate and unconditional withassistance to transport necessaries drawal of instructions for the general strike. of life.

SAYS LEADERS LOSE CONTROL

He became convinced last night, he asserted, that A. Pugh, chairman of Trades Union Congress, and his colleagues were no longer in control of the situation within their own ranks.

The Premier said that it was no use disguising the facts All industry stopped. Troops in-tervened, thousands of arrests made of the seriousness of the situation with words that conceal the truth. He declared that he did not believe that there had been a thorough consultation with the rank and file of the Trades Union Council before the power of calling a general strike had been put into the hands of a small group of executives in London. This, he felt, was a gross travesty of every democratic principle.

Premier Baldwin told the House that continuance of the gov ernmental subsidy to the coal industry was out of the question. He said that the government's single aim had been to obtain
