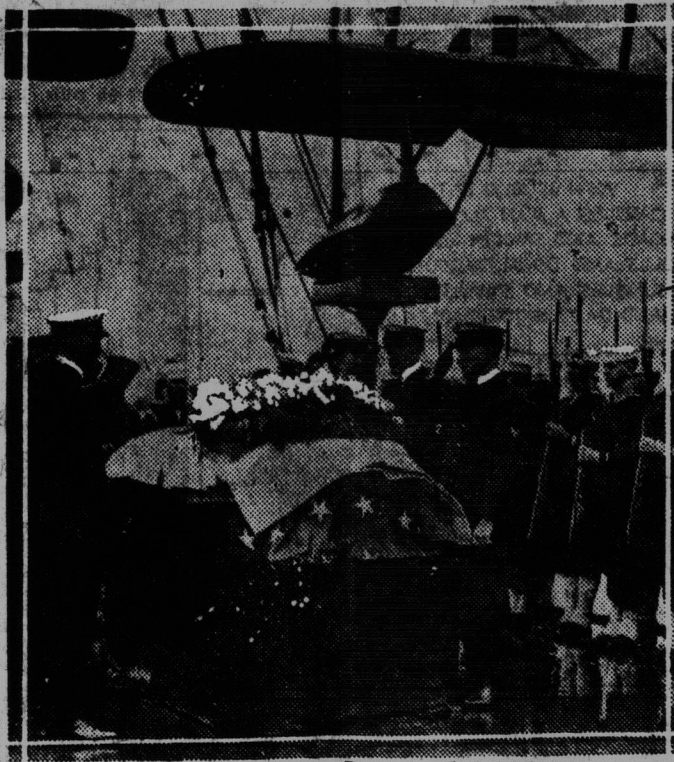

The other night she took her son, Arthur, 17, with her and followed Fedelli. Fedelli was shot dead as he sat in his machine with Miss Hermine Ullman, 23. She says their friendship was purely platonic.

"It all wouldn't have happened if he hadn't made his money so easy," says Fedelli's friends.
