WAS FORMER ST. JOHN MAN'S WIFE

Woman Killed on St. Croix Farm was Separated From Husband. It was learned yesterday that Mrs. Viola Hooper Smith, housekeeper at Charles Suddy's farmhouse at Robbinston, on the St. Croix river about 12 miles from St. Stephen, who was mysteriously shot and killed on Sunday, was the wife of Ivan Smith, formerly of St. John but now a resident of Massachusetts. She had been separated from him for nine years. Mrs. Smith was thirty-one years of age and before marriage was Miss Viola Hooper, daughter of Alden Hooper, of Eastport. The authorities have decided that the woman was shot accidentally, possibly by a hunter in the nearby woods.

Recipe: Two squares bitter chocolate, 1 cup milk, 1/2 cup butter, 1 cup sugar, 2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 teaspoon vanilla, few grains salt, yolks of 2 eggs, one-half cup milk and cook until a smooth paste is formed. Cream butter (or butter and lard mixed) and beat in sugar. Add cooked mixture. Beat egg yolks with remaining half cup of milk and add alternately with flour. Mix well and add soda dissolved in a little hot water. Add vanilla and salt and beat well. Bake in two layers or in a dripping pan. Fudge Cake: Two cups light brown sugar, 2-3 cup butter and lard mixed and melted, 1-2 cup melted chocolate, 2 eggs, 1/2 cup sour milk, 2 cups flour, 1/2 cup boiling water, 1 teaspoon vanilla, few grains salt, 1 teaspoon soda. Cream shortening and sugar. Melt chocolate over hot water and add to mixture. Add eggs (unbeaten) and beat well. Stir in sour milk. Add...

HEARD FIVE SHOTS

Hearing five shots in the neighboring woods in quick succession Jewell called to Suddy then in the kitchen. Mrs. Smith looked from the kitchen window and noticing a flock of sheep in the pasture a short distance away were running, turned to Suddy, saying, "Someone is firing at our sheep." Then she went to the front door and looked six shots was heard. Lee says that he heard bullets passing near his head, when one struck Mrs. Smith on the forehead just above her ear. She fell forward out of the open door to the steps, then to the ground between the wheels of a cart. Suddy rushed from the kitchen and picked her up. She died without making a sound. The body was carried into the farmhouse and Dr. Armstrong, of Robbinston, was called. Sheriff James Cummings, Medical Examiner MacDonald, County Attorney Sawyer and Deputy Sheriffs John W. Whalan and Frank Smith, and Undertaker Young, of Calais, visited the Suddy farmhouse. After an autopsy it was decided that the woman was accidentally shot. Suddy is a native of Syria and came to Robbinston fifteen years ago. His wife was Miss Lyons of a neighboring town. They have four sons and two daughters. Three years ago Suddy and his wife separated by agreement, when she received a settlement. They were not divorced. Two years ago, Mr. and Mrs. Alden Hooper and daughter, Mrs. Viola Hooper, moved to the Suddy farmhouse to make their home. Mrs. Hooper died of cancer there more than a year and a half ago. Hooper returned to Eastport, but his daughter remained with Suddy, until she was married to Ivan Smith, who went there from St. John, but has been in Massachusetts for the last nine years. Mrs. Smith was separated from her husband. Letter From St. John Man. Allen Hooper said yesterday that about a week ago his daughter had received a letter from Smith which he has been unable to find. While Suddy has a successful farm keeping 500 hens, 80 sheep, two horses, a tractor and automobile truck, has two big barns and raised 20,000 cabbages and quantities of other vegetables for peddling, he is not liked by some of the neighbors. Suddy, who is fifty-one years old, says many are jealous of his success. He is afraid of being shot and thinks that the bullet that killed the housekeeper was intended for him. The fatal accident is thought to be due to a careless hunter. Suddy says his sheep have been shot and stolen.
