

Woman Explorer Says Wild Days In Borneo Have Gone

Exhibits Parangs With Hair Still
Clinging to Steel as Evidence
That Headmen Were Formerly
Active.

London, May 18 (By Mail)—Mrs. Charlotte Cameron, woman explorer, who has just returned to London after eighteen months in Java, Sumatra, North Borneo and the Philippines, told an interesting tale of her adventures to a "Star" reporter.

"These," she exclaimed, unsheathing two formidable looking weapons from their scabbards, "are the parangs used by the head hunters of Sarawak, in Borneo. In the old days the natives slashed off the heads of their own people without much discrimination, though they never touched a white head, and here you see the human hair clinging to the steel."

"The old ferocious days in Borneo (all north of the equator is British and all south Dutch) have gone, though you still see and hear the wild men on the roadside. The Dyaks are splendid natives. They wear huge feathers of the hornbills as headdress, and the women are clad in corsets of fiber covered with brass rings. The race is light copper colored. I saw one huge snake, which had just swallowed a young deer."

Mrs. Cameron has brought home some lovely specimens of batik work and sarongs. A sarong is a brilliant colored silk cloth. There are not so many of them made nowadays; it is a pre-civilization industry, but it shows what exquisite work was widely made in semi-barbaric times. Mrs. Cameron talked of the Dyaks blowing their poisoned arrows 800 yards from their tubes with the most deadly accuracy; of Mount Kinabalu, the towering mountain in Borneo, named after "The Chinese Widow," in whose arms, the natives believe, is paradise after death; of insects as big as rats, and far bolder; of the mangosteens, the pink native fruit, which cannot be sent abroad in cold storage; and of the durian, the flesh-fruit, which she described as resembling a decayed custard being poured through a gas pipe with a flash of onion and cayenne pepper in it."
