

CANADA'S EXPORTS EQUAL IMPORTS

Total Trade For Twelve Months \$2,517,656,372, an Increase of About \$273,000,000.

Ottawa, Aug. 27.—For the twelve months ended July 31, Canada's imports and exports were about equal with imports of \$1,238,191,735 and exports of \$1,264,464,637. The total duty collected for this year's period was \$208,001,705. The total trade for this period was \$2,517,656,372, compared with the former corresponding annual period of a total trade of \$2,244,258,963.

There was imported from the United Kingdom \$191,052,284 and exported to that country \$409,481,299. From the United States we bought \$881,216,535 and sold that country \$489,746,802. From Cuba we imported \$80,523,799, from British East Indies \$18,846,011, from British West Indies \$15,443,825 and from

British Guiana \$6,785,490. Exports of agricultural products are about equal to the corresponding period of the previous year, but there was a decrease of about \$175,000,000 in cartridges and other explosives. The greatest increase in export was in wood and wood products, increasing from \$97,900,000 to nearly \$200,000,000.

In imports, the principle increase was in cotton from \$65,192,686 to \$119,200,887, iron and steel from \$148,363,407 to \$176,008,280; sugar and molasses from \$47,946,288 to \$92,738,416 and wool from \$41,375,571 to \$88,090,576.

MAGISTRATE FINED IN LIQUOR CASE

Former Ontario Mayor and Constable in Trouble.

Windsor, Ont., Aug. 27.—Dr. Fred Park, for many years mayor of Amherstburg and a magistrate of that place, was fined \$1,000 and costs by Magistrate Alfred Miers in the police court today, following a plea of guilty entered by Dr. Park to a charge of having on May 26 last been in possession of liquor in a place other than a private dwelling. In explanation of the matter, Dr. Park told the court that the liquor in his barn was not his property and that he had merely had it put there in the public interests, so that it might not be stolen.

San Benoit, an Amherstburg constable, who was arrested on the same charge, denied any illegal connection with the affair. He said he had merely helped Dr. Park to put the liquor in the barn. He will be tried Tuesday.

WANT SHIPPING RATE EQUALIZED

Ottawa, Aug. 27.—(Canadian Press)—Asking that the government take steps to equalize the shipping rates on flour, as compared with wheat, a large deputation, including members of the Dominion Millers' Association, transportation companies and a representative of the Canadian merchant marine, met the government this afternoon.

Sir George Foster stated after the conference that the millers requested the government to take steps toward leveling the rates of flour and wheat. At the present time wheat is favored, in regard to rates for ocean shipment. The suggestion was made that the government might, through its merchant marine, set a lower rate for flour. In that way the other transportation companies will have to fall in line.

STEAMER ON FIRE

Chatham, Aug. 27.—Fire has been burning for several days in the coal in the bunkers of the Glasgow steamship Souja, which is loading spool wood here for the Paisley thread mills. The work of loading the vessel was suspended and powerful streams were turned on the coal. The fire is under control. The Souja registers 1,128 tons.

General Society With Headquarters in New York Will be Formed.

Ottawa, Aug. 27.—With a view to perpetuating the heroic work of Dr. Wilfrid T. Grenfell's mission along the coast of Labrador, friends of Dr. Grenfell in Canada, United States, Newfoundland, England and elsewhere, are banding themselves together into a society, according to word reaching the capital. The headquarters of the organization will be in New York. The objects of the association are said to be to further the objects of the mission and to take steps, while Dr. Grenfell is still able to direct the work, to guarantee that the work will go on after he has been compelled to give up its direction.

CANADIANS TO MAN WARSHIPS

(Canadian Press Despatch)

Ottawa, Aug. 27.—The Department of Naval Service is making an effort to obtain a limited number of ratings to man the new ships which the mother country has presented to Canada, and bring them to this country. Men with experience are desired and when obtained they

will be sent to England. As far as the officers of the new ships are concerned, it is understood that two-thirds of them will be Canadians, and it is stated that both of the destroyers will be commanded by Canadians. The cruiser will, the time being, be under the command of an experienced British naval officer. The three vessels will probably sail for Canada early in October.


