### COUNCIL ADOPTS RESOLUTION RE HARBOR MATTER

Only One Dissenting Voice, That of Mr. Bullock

Vocational Training Grant Also Passed; City Will Pay Engineers Union Wages—Claim For Extra Work on City Road

The resolution presented at yesterday's meeting of the common council, and printed elsewhere in the Times, was adopted by the council at the adjourned meeting, Commissioner Bullock being the only one of the commissioners to vote against it. The addition of the word "North" before "Hodney" in the resolution was agreed to and the resolution with this amendment carried.

On motion of the commissioner of public safety the quarterly bill for street lighting from the N. B. Power Co., amounting to \$8,584.18, was ordered to be handed to the comptroller for payment.

An application from the C. N. Ry. for permission to erect a five-light standard in front of their ticket office in King street, was referred to Commissioner Thornton.

A resolution was read from the Ladies' Branch of the Church of England Institute, protesting against the destruction of the court house. It was ordered filed.

**Engineers' Pay.**  
Commissioner Fisher moved that he be authorized to increase the wages of stationery engineers in the public works department from \$4 to the union rate, \$4.65 a day, to take effect from October 29. This affects only three men at present. The motion was carried.

On motion of Commissioner Fisher the public works department was authorized to arrange for purchase of 500,000 granite blocks from Morrison & Newlands at \$87.20 a thousand, with the option of increasing the number to 100,000.

The manager of the Victory Garage wrote protesting against the erection of a building in the rear of their premises in Duke street for the storage of safety department apparatus, stating that a runway leading to the second floor of the garage would have to be taken away and would make that part of the building useless. He stated he did not know that any part of the runway was on city property. The matter was referred to Commissioner Thornton.

A letter from the Board of School Trustees was received advising that they had, at the request of the council, appointed a vocational training board consisting of Dr. A. F. Emery, Thomas Nagle, J. D. P. Lewis, Mrs. Richard O'Brien, representing the Board of School Trustees; Geo. P. Hennessey, representing labor; Mrs. W. E. Raymond, representing house making and Alex. Wilson, representing employers.
