LET MARRIED WOMEN LEAVE JOBS TO MEN

That is Request of the Central
G. W. V. A. to Dominion
Government

Toronto, April 29—Married women
who occupy well-paid positions while
their husbands are also making sufficient
money to keep them in comfort will not
be allowed to continue their present
lucrative employment if the Central G.
W. V. A. executive are successful in a
request to the government voiced in the
following resolution:

"That this committee goes on record
as being opposed to the employment of
married women whose husbands are em-
ployed and capable of supporting their
families and we recommend that the
government be memorialized to investi-
gate and immediately discharge the

large number of women who come in
this category and replace them by dis-
abled returned soldiers or deserving and
needy women."

Hampton Red Cross Society, reports for
the period from Sept. 4, 1914, to Feb.
11, 1919, as follows:
The Hampton branch of the Red Cross
Society was organized in Sept. 4, 1914,
by Lady Tilley.

Amount of money raised and
contributed \$4,118.87
Amount spent on supplies and
donated as per list \$,860.98

Balance on hand \$ 257.94
Amounts contributed to various ob-
jects were as follows:
For prisoners of war fund, \$400.
For special medical supplies overseas,
\$100.
For Hampton bed in Canadian hospi-
tal at Ramsgate, \$50.
For British Red Cross, \$85.
For Canadian hospital at Paris, \$25.
For motor ambulance at St. John, \$25.
For British Red Cross, \$50.
For Dominion Red Cross appeal, \$100.
For France Day, \$50.
For military hospital, St. John, \$80.
The following work was made and
has been shipped:

1,667 hospital shirts, 3,644 pairs of
knitted socks, 1,536 laparotomy stockings,
688 pyjama suits, 1,270 personal property
bags, 2,259 mouth wipes, 791 surgical
pads, 326 pneumonia jackets, 362 band-
ages, 222 handkerchiefs, 140 abdominal
belts, 23 knitted caps, 28 bed socks, 45
feather pillows, 30 nightgowns, 14 pil-
low slips, 41 linen towels, 60 pair knitted
wrists, 63 instrumental bags, 16
pair knitted mittens, 12 housewives, 26
crutch pads, 16 knitted scarves, 9 knitted
washcloths, 1 case old linen, 3 quilts,
72 Christmas stockings, 450 bottles of
jam.

Sent to Halifax the time of the disas-
ter, twenty-four cases Red Cross sup-
plies.

Made for Serbian relief, 31 skirts with
waists attached, 40 shirts.

DECIES GIVES UP POST AS IRISH CENSOR; OFFICIAL OF UNIONIST ALLIANCE SUCCESSOR

London, April 29—It is announced
that the Irish press censor, Baron Decies,
has resigned and that Major Bryan R.
Cooper, honorable secretary of the Irish
Unionist Alliance, succeeds him.

An official communication, issued
through the Irish press explains that it
has been decided to retain the Irish cen-
sor in the interest of peace as it is im-
possible for the government to permit
any section of the Irish press to be used
as an instrument for incitement to or-
ganized defiance of the law or for the
purpose of inflaming public opinion to a
pitch where acts of violence become
possible.
